As we journey towards Easter, we must try to focus on the path that Jesus trod as he prepared to lay down his life for the world. We are exploring the theme of discipleship over these weeks, and I will be leading some devotional studies at Tuesday Bible Bite based on a booklet by the late Rob Frost – **The Way of the Cross**. This will help us study some of the key aspects of what it is to follow Jesus.

My daily readings have been in Galatians over recent days and one well-known verse jumped off the page which perhaps sums up what our focus should be in this season of Lent:

"I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I now live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me." 2:20

As I ponder these challenging words, I must ask myself - have I truly died to the world and all it stands for? Is my life now hidden with Christ in God (Colossians 3:3). Paul says there that we as believers have been raised with Christ. We now live on another plain entirely and so should have died to worldly priorities. He urges the Colossian church – *"Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things."*

As we look to the cross of Jesus and see the amazing grace of God flowing out to us, we are encouraged to discover what it is to live by faith not by sight; to put our faith in Jesus and his death and resurrection. As we begin to understand the fullness of what God has done, it should completely reshape our priorities.

The way of the cross is one of self-denial as we look to Jesus who gave it all for us. He came to save us, and he calls us to take up our cross and to follow in his footsteps. The writer to the Hebrews calls us to fix our eyes on Jesus who went all the way to the cross for us – "Consider him who endured such opposition from sinners, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart." (12:3).

It can be a tough road and sadly many do give up or are lured to take an easier deceptive path. Jesus warned about this. We need



one another and the encouragement and support of fellow pilgrims as we journey together on the way of the cross. It may seem unattractive at times, but it is truly the path to life. If we want to share in the glory of his resurrection, we must also be willing to partake in suffering with and for Jesus (Romans 8:17). Many pay a heavy price for this around the world today.

God loved the world so much that he gave his one and only Son. People of every tribe and tongue were in view as the Jewish Messiah met

his end at the hands of the Romans, after rejection by God's people and the temple authorities. From the time of Abraham, it was always God's intention to bless the nations of the world. The coming of Jesus and his death are the lynchpin in that plan.

You and I were on God's heart as Jesus died on the cross.

May we all take time this month to prepare for *"the most sacred event in the Christian calendar"*, as Rob Frost describes Good Friday. Let us step out of the rat race and press into the Lord and take a while to pause and rest in the presence of the living God as we reflect on the wondrous cross. This is the symbol of the Christian faith and serves as a constant reminder of the price that was paid to set us free from sin and set us on the path to abundant life.

We will be called to make sacrifices and to put others first as our lives are shaped and moulded to reflect the image of our Saviour and Lord. It may feel an upward struggle at times, but he gives us his Spirit to equip and empower us. Let's journey on together and not be ashamed of the cross, which is a symbol of both death and new life.

Shanklin URC Bookshop

The bookshop reopened on 14th February after a short break for Christmas and stocktaking.

The bookshop is open each week on Wednesdavs and Thursdays, 10:00 - 13:00. From the beginning of March it will also be open 10:00 - 13:00 on the second Tuesday of each month and on some Fridays for a shorter time.

& Joan (e-mail address johndfrend@aol.com). Help is particularly needed on Tuesdays; it doesn't have to be a commitment to a morning every week as there is also an option to do a morning once or twice a month.

A selection of Easter cards is now available in the bookshop. The cards have been produced by the Leprosy Mission and all include a Bible verse. The cards are available singly, priced 65p and 75p.

The bookshop also has a selection of cards which are blank inside, for your own greeting, that can be used for a variety of occasions. Although they are blank they all include a Bible verse. As well as single cards there are notecard packs and postcard packs. The notecards are in packs of 10 (5 each of 2 designs) in a cardboard wallet priced £3.99. The Blessings Postcards are in packs of 15 in a cardboard wallet priced at £6.00. The postcards are produced by the Leprosy Mission and all have a colour photo and a Bible verse.

Good News! – Akram (name changed for security reasons) from Bangladesh freed after 81 days in jail

Akram from Bangladesh has been released from prison after 81 days – thank you for your prayers for him and his family.

This family of believers from a Muslim background have faced significant persecution and opposition for their faith.

Akram* from Bangladesh has been released from prison after 81 days and is grateful for your prayers.

A believer from a Muslim background, he was arrested on 16th November 2023 when his relatives and members of the community made false accusations against him. He was freed on bail on 7th January 2024 after 81 days in a local prison in northern Bangladesh.

When he returned home to his family, he spoke to Open Doors partners to express his thanks for their – and your – support.

"I am thankful to all of you for continuously praying for me and for supporting my family in my absence," he said. "You supported my wife with encouragement and prayers and supported my family with food. Because of your support, my wife was able to protect and carry our family burdens. Thank you very much for whatever you have been doing for us."

His family are very happy about his return; his children couldn't stop hugging him and holding his hand. Now Akram hopes to spend time recovering mentally and physically from his ordeal. He also asks for continued prayer for them, and that they would be able to forgive those who falsely accused him.

Please Pray

- For a full recovery for Akram, and that he and his family will adjust well to normal life
- That Akram and his family will continue to trust in the Lord and be strengthened by the persecution they've experienced
- That God will give them forgiving hearts toward their persecutors.

Open the Book Update – Engaged Children, Happy Staff.

Presenting stories to a hall of 350 children, requires things to be clearly visible. Small props cannot be seen by those at the back, and anything on the



floor can only be seen by those in the front couple of rows. Here, the burning bush has been put on a table and Moses' leprous hand is a large garden glove. When his staff turned into a (draught excluder) snake, it climbed up the 'tree'.






The children love to participate in Open the Book. As soon as we ask for volunteers from a particular year, virtually every hand in the class shoots up. The first assembly of 2024 was the visit of the magi. At the end, the teacher said he was amazed that we had involved 7 children with only 30 seconds preparation. That was how long it took to dress them as starwatchers, Herod's advisors, Mary, Joseph and a camel.



What the teacher had not spotted is that we had an 'invisible' storyteller (dressed all in black) who accompanied the children, whispering instructions as the story unfolded: 'point at the star', 'carry the basket and follow the star', 'make the toddler doll walk', 'take one of the gifts from the basket and put it on the table', 'pretend to sleep'.




In addition, the children watching are asked to repeat certain phrases actions. and For example - worried (stroke your chin), angry (shake your fists) upset (put your head in your hands and shake it) Pausing after each of these words, the narrator then read: Herod was worried. Well. worried and angry. Actually, quite worried and angry and upset. Parents have told us that their children

continue to use our words and actions when they return home, especially when the phrase has a rhythm, such as '**trav**elled a **very** long **way**'. The teacher complemented the children on their participation, saying it proved how engaged they were with the story.

The next story was 12 year old Jesus (played by a child) staying in the Temple. The family went to celebrate the Passover in Jerusalem. As Mary 'lit' a (battery operated) menorah the children gasped. At the end, the teacher thanked us for reinforcing what the Year 5s had recently been taught about the significance of the (knitted) roast lamb and bitter herbs.

The menorah remained lit until the last child left the hall, making a beautiful tableau which will hopefully remain in their hearts.

Through Christ God provided a way for us into His family. As God's adopted child, you have been given a new identity and a new name. You're no longer a spiritual orphan; you're a son or daughter of God. Romans 8:16&17, tells us, "The Spirit Himself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, heirs also, heirs of God and fellow heirs with Christ."

If you're beginning to think you are someone special as a Christian, you're thinking right - you are special! Your specialness is not the result of anything you have done, of course. It's all God's doing. All you did was respond to God's invitation to be His child. But as a child of God, in union with God by being in Christ, you have every right to enjoy your special relationship with your new Father.

How important is it to know who you are in Christ? There are countless numbers of Christians who struggle with day-to-day behaviour because they labour under a false perception of who they are. They see themselves as sinners who hope to make it into heaven by God's grace, but they can't seem to live above their sinful tendencies. Why can't they live the victorious Christian life? Because they have a misperception of who they are in Christ.

But look again at the hope-filled words above (1 John 3:1-3). What is the believer's hope? That he will someday be changed into Christ's image? That's part of it, but that's only a future hope. What is your hope for today and tomorrow? That you're a child of God now! You must see yourself as a child of God in order to live like a child of God. The blessed hope for the believer is

"God has chosen to make known among the Gentiles the glorious riches of this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory." (Colossians 1:27).

Thank You, Father, for the glorious hope of being Your child. I want to live in the security and blessing of that reality today.

Understanding Who You Are

"For those who are led by the Spirit of God are the children of God." (Romans 8:14)

I enjoy asking people, "Who are you?" It sounds like a simple question requiring a simple answer, but it really isn't. For example, if someone asked me, "Who are you?" I might answer, "Neil Anderson".

"No, that's your name. Who are you?"

"I'm an American".

"No, that's where you live".

I could also say that I'm five feet nine inches tall (1.7 metres) and a little over 150 pounds (68 kg) - actually quite a little over 150 pounds (68 kg)! But my physical dimensions and appearance aren't me either. If you chopped off my arms and legs, would I still be me? If you transplanted my heart, kidneys or liver, would I still be me? Of course! Now if you keep chopping, you'll get to me eventually because I'm in here somewhere. But who I am is far more than what you see on the outside.

We may say with the apostle Paul that we "recognise no man according to the flesh". But we tend to identify each other and ourselves primarily by physical appearance (tall, short, stocky, slender) or by what we do (plumber, carpenter, nurse, engineer, clerk).

Furthermore, when asked to identify ourselves in relation to our faith, we usually talk about our doctrinal position (Protestant, evangelical, Calvinist, charismatic), our denominational preference (Baptist, Presbyterian, Methodist, Independent), or our role in the church (Sunday school teacher, choir member, deacon, usher, etc.).

But is who you are determined by what you do, or is what you do determined by who you are? That's an important question, especially as it relates to Christian maturity. I subscribe to the latter. I believe wholeheartedly that your hope for growth, meaning and fulfilment as

a Christian is based on understanding who you are - specifically your identity in Christ as a child of God. Your understanding of who you are in Christ will greatly determine how you live your life.

Lord Jesus, I know I am complete in You. Don't allow me to fall back into fleshly attributes today in an attempt to impress others or You.

The Cost of Discipleship

Our minister, Brian, has just begun a series on '**Discipleship**' and this promises to be really helpful as we hear what it means to truly follow Jesus.

We have been **so** blessed with freedom to worship in our country, but for many who embrace Christianity the cost can be very high.

Becoming. a Christian in Eritrea, (**number 4** in the **Open Doors 2024 World Watch List**), cost, *Abdullah everything: his job, his freedom, and eventually his life. This persecution might have ended if he renounced Jesus - but that was something he refused to do. **He knew Jesus is worth the cost**.

Here is more of his story and of the situation of believers in his country:

Eritrea is called the 'North Korea of Africa' because of its severe authoritarian government. While there are three officially recognised Christian denominations (Eritrean Orthodox, Roman Catholic and Lutheran), converting from Islam - like Abdullah did - or belonging to an Evangelical church is extremely dangerous. Churches are regularly raided, and more than 1,000 Eritrean Christians are currently imprisoned for their faith.

Abdullah grew up in a traditional Muslim family when he converted to Christianity, he didn't keep his new faith quiet. He had a passion to share the Gospel and told everyone at work about Jesus - he wanted them to know the good news too. This was particularly dangerous because Abdullah worked in a government office.

One of his coworkers, was angry about Abdullah's Christian activities. He asked Abdullah to meet him at the office, but it was a trap: the man secretly recorded Abdullah while baiting him into making political comments. The next day, Abdullah was arrested, charged and sent to prison.

In prison, he was only given food three times a week. His wife shares that she wasn't allowed to bring him anything, and he wasn't allowed to have visits from his family. Abdullah got very sick in prison - and tragically, he eventually died. If he'd agreed to reconvert to Islam, the charges would have been dropped. But no hunger, torture or illness could separate Abdullah from the love of God.

Pray with Eritrean Christians

Father God, thank you that no authoritarian regime can stand in the way of Your love. Please comfort Abdullah's widow and children and strengthen and encourage all Eritreans in prison for loving You. Equip the local Church as they support and strengthen persecuted Christians in Eritrea. Amen.

Some of you will remember the prayer initiative some years from **Release International** – '**Pray 173**', to galvanise prayer for the 173 prisoners of faith who were in prison with a sentence of ten years or more.

Sadly, the persecution still continues so please do uphold the believers in this and countless other nations where to be a disciple of Jesus is a dangerous path to take.

And do please take a copy of the new World Watch List from the back of the church – perhaps you might pray for a country a week, which will take a year – or even more frequently, there are inspirational stories and testimonies of our brothers and sisters and helpful information about their countries, as well as 'counting the cost' devotionals to help us reflect on our faith – again very timely to link in with our sermon series **discipleship** at present.

on our Christian Brothers and Sisters being persecuted for their faith

Pastor kidnapped and his children killed in the Democratic Republic of the Congo as attacks increase

A church leader and his wife have been abducted by members of the Allied Democratic Forces (ADF) during a worship service; during the attack, their two children were killed. **Please pray** for our church family in DRC, and for the safe return of all who've been taken.

Christians in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) are calling for 'fervent prayer' after an attack on a church saw the pastor and his wife abducted and their children killed.

On 30 January, the lead pastor of the Eglise Message du Temps Church, his wife and an unconfirmed number of Christians were abducted in Bayeti, Ituri Province, in the north east of DRC. During the attack, which took place in the middle of a worship service, five others were killed – including the pastor's two children.

This latest tragedy is part of a growing trend in DRC which is seeing more frequent attacks on Christian communities by the Islamic extremist group ADF.

Christians are unsafe at work and church

Between 28th - 30th January, the ADF killed at least 12 Christians in a series of attacks on the Mangadola, Makodu, Mangazi and Matadi villages. The militants, armed with guns and machetes, killed Christians while they were working on their farms. For many, farming is their main source of income.

"Christians cannot go to their farms anymore. We are now landlocked in Oicha; the cost of living is very, very expensive, God

help us," lamented Pastor Paluku, a pastor and teacher at the Oicha Bible Institute.

"This umpteenth attack on the village of Bayeti has led to the closure of the church," says Jean-Paul, a Christian and member of the local civil society. "Most of the population had fled for Oicha, which was deemed safe. Now the situation has worsened. The young people from Oicha went to these villages on 31st January 2024 to collect the bodies and put them in the mortuary of the Oicha General Hospital.

ADF attacks have been recorded spanning from 8th January 2024 onwards, with 26 people known to have been killed and more than 30 people abducted. In some cases, the ADF even attacked communities in mourning. Some Christians, no longer feeling safe at home, are resorting to sleeping in open spaces with almost no protection.

"Scale of attacks is alarming"

"This latest incident is just another example of the ongoing violence against the church in north east DRC," says Jo Newhouse, an Open Doors spokesperson for the sub-Saharan region. "The DRC has nearly seven million people who are displaced, with around five million concentrated in the eastern part of the country, according to the UN. The continued weak rule of law has enabled violence, including abductions, detentions, and murders to continue with impunity. The scale of attacks is alarming: Christian villages have been burned down; pastors, priests, and lay Christians are abducted almost every week, and untold suffering has been inflicted on Christian communities by the ADF and other armed factions."

In ADF-controlled areas, expression of Christian faith is dangerous. Members of the group harass, abduct, and kill believers wearing Christian symbols or those meeting for fellowship. Children are abducted from school, forced to convert to Islam and married off to members of the ADF.

Christians ask for resilience

"We call on the worldwide body of Christ to commit the church in eastern DRC to fervent prayer," Jo continues. "Open Doors continues to provide practical and spiritual support to affected

Christians and churches and to advocate for them. We urge the government to fulfil its international obligation and its duty to protect civilians. We also urge the government, its international partners and the global community to acknowledge the scale of the problem and urgently work to address root causes."

"We ask brothers and sisters around the world to pray for the consolation of afflicted families and implore God's mercy for the return of peace to the territory of Beni," asks Pastor Paluku. "Pray for the survival of Christians trapped in the community of Oicha. Pray for the resilience of the Christians of Ngite, Mangodola, Makodo, Mangazi and Matadi."

Please Pray

- For God's comfort for bereaved families and communities, and for the safe return of the pastor, his wife, and other abducted Christians
- For displaced believers in north east DRC, that the Lord will provide for them in abundance and for the host community
- For the resilience of Christians across DRC, and that the Lord will restore peace in these areas so that the church will continue as a beacon of hope.


