View From Number 10 The government will be on his shoulders

August is a month when the sun often disappears as the kids are off school, but this year I think we are still due some proper summer weather. The Island is busy and buzzing and we must now remember not to go through Lake traffic lights in the late afternoon when all the holidaymakers are heading back to base!

It's also a fresh season as we have two new MPs! We must pray for our new members of Parliament; do remember that a few of our number live in the West constituency. Paul says to Timothy that we must pray for those in authority: "I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people – for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness." (1 Timothy 2:1-2).

We may often be quick to point the finger when we feel things are not right, but how much do we get behind our nation's leaders in heartfelt prayer? As I thought about this subject, I was reminded of those beautiful words from Isaiah 9 that we hear read at Christmas about the coming of God's anointed:

"For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Of the greatness of his government and peace there will be no end."

May our new Government be upheld upon his strong shoulders. How much we need such firm foundations to be re-established in our modern world. Our society had been largely built upon Christian principles, but much has been watered down and eroded in my lifetime. We must pray and take an active interest in all that is going on locally, nationally and beyond. Significant things have been happening in France and we watch with interest, and some incredulity, the developments across the pond!

I was encouraged to read a post by Andy Flanagan, Executive Director of Christians in Politics (and a co-author of the recent new hymn We seek your Kingdom) after the election – he said: "26 of those entering the House of Commons for the first time today are Jesus-followers... and probably more that I don't know."

This is very positive news. Do please hold these sisters and brothers in your prayers. In recent times, some like Tim Farron (Lib Dem) and Kate Forbes (SNP) have taken a bashing for holding to their Christian perspective. May God's people stand strong in the corridors of power and have a positive influence in the way things shape up in the coming years.

It has been good to be praying for local business as folk from several The Bay churches have spoken blessings over some 80 establishments right along the seafront from Yaverland to the Fisherman's Cottage - and dropped in to tell them. We also had *Free the Wight* in May and our midsummer prayer walk which was a wonderful time of intercession for our community. Do join us for a Prayer Breakfast on 17th August - and with folk from Bay churches who will join us for a bring-and-share tea at 17:00 on 1st September to prayerfully consider our united work and witness.

Let's be fully engaged in the culture around us and be good news people in what can often be a bad news world. Prayer must be the starting point, but it often leads to God's direction for us to get directly involved in action. Be careful what you pray!

Dear Friends,

Firstly, thank you for all your contributions to your local church in 2023. This includes your financial contribution which plays an important part in the life of the whole church through the Ministries & Mission Fund.

As officers of the denomination, it's good for us to be rooted in a local URC (or LEP) congregation and to work out our faith in the local context, as well as across the entire United Reformed Church. On the other hand, it is good for you in local churches to know that those who serve you nationally understand the local church financial issues as well. And there have been some big issues over the last 12-18 months: inflation, a "cost of living crisis" for many, with energy costs rising unprecedented levels etc. Churches and ministers have had the same challenges as so many others.

The M&M Fund of the URC pays for ministers' stipends, training, Assembly costs and all the central support functions for ministry in the URC across three nations. The M&M Fund's main income is contributions from the churches with some top-up from synods, together with investment income and grants etc.

In 2023 the churches continued to support the M&M Fund to a wonderful level, but there also was significant and generous synod support. Overall, the giving to M&M Fund was slightly ahead of budget at £16.3 million. It was also only 2% down on 2022's result. However, we should note that these figures include the synods' extra contributions this year which amounted to £1.9 million, an increased amount compared to 2022.

The full M&M account for 2023 in summary:

Income: £18.2m

- of which 16.3m was from churches and synods contributions

Expenditure: £19.3m

Deficit: £1.1m

2024 is not going to be an easy year either and we are again budgeting for a deficit. We have a commitment from synods to continue their support on top of church contributions and a plan for balancing the M&M budget over the next 5-7 years, including budget reductions of central costs of 3 to 5% p.a.

So, thank you to all who continued to contribute to your local church, thank you to all those churches who met their commitment for 2023 in full, and thank you to all those who, in adversity, continued to treat the M&M Fund as the first priority and paid what they could.

Stewardship of our resources, personally, as local churches and as a denomination is rarely easy, but it is one of the challenges we are called to in making our faith real. As the Spirit directs and as our means allow, can the churches once more continue to respond to the call of our gracious, loving and ever-generous God?

Again, thank you all!

The excellent **CARE Prayer Diary** for 21^{st} July -19^{th} October 2024 is now available in the lobby at church.

The picture on the front is of a rowing boat, anchored securely on the seashore.

Anchors, although small in comparison are vital to hold ships safely, keeping them from being wrecked on rocks, buffeted by storms and drifting with currents. Sometimes boats come to land and sometimes carries the anchor up the beach to a strong fixed place so the vessel doesn't float back out to sea (as on



the cover picture).

Many of us will be familiar with the hymn, 'We have an anchor, that keeps the soul...' and the words of Scripture from Hebrews 6:18-20 maybe were an inspiration for this:

'We who have fled to Him for refuge can have great confidence as we hold to the hope that lies before us. This hope is a strong and trustworthy anchor for our souls, it leads us through the curtain into God's inner sanctuary. Jesus has already gone in there for us.' NLT



Follow the Leader ~ Part 2

"Jesus said to his disciples, 'Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me will find it. What good will it be for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul? Or what can anyone give in exchange for their soul?" (Matthew 16:24-26)

Last time I asked the question "If we have chosen to follow Jesus, what should our walk be based upon?" and we began by looking at the power that Christ bestows on us as we choose to follow our Leader... now we turn to the practicalities of demonstrating our faith in a world which so desperately needs to hear the Good News. Here is Neil Anderson on the subject:

Demonstrating What We Believe

"In the same way, faith by itself if it is not accompanied by action, is dead" (James 2:17)

Faith is an action word. We cannot passively respond to God.

You may have heard the story of the circus performer who strung a wire over a river and proceeded to ride across it on a unicycle. When he returned, everyone applauded. Then he asked, "Who believes I can do that with a man on my shoulders?" Everyone responded in affirmation. He said, "All right, who will hop on?" The person who hops on is the person who really believes. Faith is not

just giving credence to something or someone. Faith is demonstrated reliance upon something or someone.

Faith has the same operating dynamic as *agape* love. When we refer to love as a noun, we're talking about character: patience, kindness, etc. When we say that God is love, we are describing His character. Paul says the goal of our instruction is love; therefore, the goal of Christian education is character transformation.

However, when love is used as a verb, it is expressed by action:

"For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son...." (John 3:16)

If we say we love someone and do nothing on their behalf, it's only sentimentality and not *agape* love. True love is expressed by meeting the needs of others.

Faith has a similar dynamic. When using faith as a noun, we're talking about what we believe. But if we're talking about faith as a verb, then it is expressed in the way we live. James says it like this:

"faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead. But someone will say 'You have faith; I have deeds'. Show me your faith without deeds, and I will show you my faith by my deeds" (James 2:17&18)

We demonstrate what we believe by how we live our lives. If we believe it, we will do it. If we don't, then what we believe is just wishful thinking.

Lord, help me put feet to my faith every day and not rely on past accomplishments. I rejoice in Your eternal promises, Lord. You are my Rock which never crumbles.

Confessing What We Believe

"If you declare with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you profess your faith and are saved" (Romans 10:9&10)

One primary means by which we express our belief is confession - verbally expressing what we believe. God requires us to take our stand in this world. Jesus made this plain:

"If anyone is ashamed of me and my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, the Son of Man will be ashamed of them when he comes in his Father's glory with the holy angels" (Mark 8:38)

"For by your words you will be acquitted, and by your words you will be condemned" (Matthew 12:37)

"Truly I tell you, if anyone says to this mountain, 'Go, throw yourself into the sea,' and does not doubt in their heart but believes that what they say will happen, it will be done for them" (Mark 11:23)

Jesus does not say we shall have whatever we believe, but we shall have whatever we believe and confess. Confession gives expression to what is believed. The confession of the mouth must accurately express the belief of the heart. To defeat Satan, we must speak forth the Word of God, which is the sword of the Spirit (Ephesians 6).

In our English translations, two different words are used for the Word of God. The most common is *logos* and it indicates the whole revealed Word of God (John 1:1). The other word is *rhema*. There is only one Word of God, but the emphasis of *rhema* is in its expression. We are to hide the whole Word (*logos*) in our hearts, and when Satan attacks, we stand against him by confessing God's Word (*rhema*).

Confessing what we believe gives proof to our faith. Confession doesn't create faith; faith makes true confession possible. Confession is agreeing with God. It is living in the light by letting our life and our mouth demonstrate what we believe in our heart

Father, I desire that what my heart believes and what my mouth confesses today line up with the truth of Your Word.

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Street Pastor News

First, I would like to say a massive thank you to everyone that donated, hosted and prayed for the Street Pastors at the IoW Festival. The mainland volunteers have said how lovely their hosts were and greatly appreciated a bed after each of their patrols.



We had an amazing time, albeit very tiring. I personally worked between 16-18hrs a day from the Thursday to the Monday of the festival. The average step count the volunteers had was 20,000 steps each patrol, I walked miles just trying to find the festival radio hut the first day. The volunteers went home with some impressive blisters and aching legs.

Some stats for you from the festival patrols: -

- Number of patrols/teams over four days = 29
- > Amount of man hours whilst on patrol = 995hrs
- Water Bottles given out = 472
- ➤ Foil Blankets = 56
- Flipflops = 10
- > Conversations = Hundreds

What we have been doing since the festival

Since the festival, we have been carrying out our normal patrols in Ryde and Newport.

On the 12th and 13th of July we launched a Safe Space at Newport Bus Station in partnership with Southern Vectis and Hampshire & loW Constabulary. This is currently in the Southern Vectis Travel Shop, which we have sole access to for the Safe Space. We would love for this to be open every Friday and Saturday night but unfortunately, we currently do not have the volunteers for this to happen, especially during the summer when we have so many other events we are covering. Currently this will be open two nights a month and on particular nights when the bus station could be busier

than usual.

On the launch night we had two significant incidents, one involving a reported missing 12 year old who we found and kept safe in the Safe Space until his mum came to collect him and the other was a vulnerable female who didn't feel safe going on the bus home as her boyfriend had told her he was going to beat her up. We kept her safe with us until her bus came, spoke to the driver who was not going to let anyone on that matched the description of the boyfriend and make sure she only got off at her stop when the person who was meeting her was present.

On the 12th and 13th, we also had a stand at the County Show for the first time, where we could inform people about Street Pastors, the Safe Space and the work we are doing to tackle the anti-social behaviour around Newport and Ryde.

We carried out two patrols on the Friday and Saturday for the pride weekend in Ryde, which was alongside the security company that we work with on our regular patrols, lots of conversations had and lots of sweets given out.

We also have a stand at the Lionheart festival on the 27th and 28th July, which we will then go straight into patrolling at Cowes Week after. We also have patrols out on Scooter Rally Weekend.

The other project I am working on is called 'Isle Be'. This is a new initiative between the IoW Council, Street Pastors, Aspire and Revive.

This initiative is to help tackle the anti-social behaviour in Newport and Ryde. We will be patrolling at earlier times of around 17:00-20:00, 2-3 times a week, when the youth are generally causing more issues in the towns.

We really need more volunteers so we can extend the patrols, open the Safe Space more often and do more events.

If you feel like you would want to volunteer, then please get in touch. If you feel you cannot walk around on patrols, then the Safe Space would be perfect for you.

Open the Book Update - 'Come Over and Help Us'

The children of Broadlea school in Lake loved watching and taking part in 'Daniel in the Lions' Den'. This was a one-off presentation to show how Open the Book works. As a result, we have been invited to take regular assemblies there beginning in September. How amazing to have non-faith schools asking Christians to come in and present God's truth to them.



Schools are required by law to hold 'a daily act of collective worship which should be wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character'. But, within days of the new government taking office, humanists again asked for this requirement to be scrapped. We need to grasp every opportunity while the schools are still open to us.

The government-funded 'Avanti Secondary School' in London is on

the short list for a prize in the 'World's Best Schools' awards. Children participate in yoga and worship Hindu gods before lessons.

The story of 'The Fiery Furnace' began with Nebuchadnezzar



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demanding that everyone must bow down to his statue whenever the instruments sounded.



Neither the exiled Jews nor Jean (our 91 year old storyteller) did so. Only Shadrach is shown being tied up ready to be thrown into the flames. The parts of Meshach, Abednego and the angel were played by children.

The good folk of St Saviour on the Cliff welcomed Open the Book during the morning service on July 7th, and some joyously participated in following Moses through the wilderness.

Praise God that we now have the nucleus of a team, but more volunteers are still needed before we can commit to serving Broadlea.



It's sad when some people criticise Open the Book because we *only* tell Bible stories without any interpretation. This wonderful testimony comes from a team on the mainland who were presenting the story of Martha criticising Mary for sitting at the feet of Jesus:

The hush upon the assembly was tangible, and after the conclusion, the teacher in charge - a lovely young woman - began to weep visibly. She took a moment to regain her composure and we were concerned in case something was wrong. However, as she stood in front of the children, with tears still pouring down her cheeks, she said, "Oh children, I have had a moment! We are all so busy, we never have time just to sit and listen to one another. And we never find time to listen to Jesus."

We, the team, would have broken the rules had we gone that far, but this teacher had been visibly moved by God as the story unfolded. She had been challenged about her own life, and the next time we went to the School (not a faith school) the Head Teacher came to

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see us to tell us that this teacher had shared her testimony in the staff room afterwards and they could all see how impacted she had been. The Head Teacher gave each of us a hug and thanked us. Iran's new president unlikely to help Christian converts

Iran's new president, Masoud Pezeshkian, is relatively moderate – but an Open Doors expert doesn't think this will easily lead to religious freedom for Iranian Christians.

Iran's new president is unlikely to bring greater freedoms to the country's Christian minority, says an Open Doors analyst. That includes eight Christian converts who were recently sent to prison, facing a total sentence of up to 45 years.

A moderate president might not help religious freedom

Two rounds of voting resulted in a majority for the Reformist Masoud Pezeshkian, who beat the ultraconservative Saeed Jalili last week. The turnout for voting was below 50%.

"The fact that Pezeshkian, a rather unknown Reformist lawmaker, was able to beat the hardline candidates shows how low the support is for the hardliners among the Iranian population," says Michael Bosch, persecution analyst with Open Doors' World Watch Research unit. "However, his election won't bring any radical change, simply because the power is in unelected hands, not the elected ones."

During the leadership of a previous moderate president, Hassan Rouhani (2013-2021), religious freedoms for Christians and other religious minorities did not improve. "Protests were still bloodily suppressed, and Christians kept receiving high prison sentences during Rouhani's term," says Bosch. "So, we will see a continuation of the arrests and heavy prison sentences, especially since the regime knows it doesn't have much support and therefore has to

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crack down hard on all dissent. This affects Christians as well as other minority groups."

Prison, fines and floggings

In recent months, Iranian authorities have intensified their crackdown on Christian converts and those active in sharing the gospel, with many receiving harsh prison sentences.

In June, the Ahvaz Revolutionary Court found eight Christians guilty after they had been arrested over the Christmas period in the western city of Izeh, reports Article 18.

While not all members of the group can be identified, it was Yasin Mousavi who reportedly received the highest sentence of 15 years in prison for 'membership in a group intent on disrupting national security' and 'propaganda against the regime'.

Other converts who received prison sentences include Hamid Afzali, who received 10 years, while Nasrullah Mousavi, Bijan Qolizadeh and Iman Salehi were each given five years. Another two people, whose names are not yet known, were given two years each, while Zahrab Shahbazi was sentenced to nine months in prison. A few weeks earlier, another member of the group who was arrested at the same time, Esmaeil Narimanpour, was sentenced to five years.

This is on top of many other believers who were arrested last year, who have chosen not to reveal their identities. "It is worrying that almost all Christians detained during the two main waves of arrests in 2023 want to remain anonymous, out of fear of being exposed to reprisals from the Iranian authorities," Bosch says. "Several were sentenced to months or years in prison, while others had to pay fines or were flogged, but the worry about staying anonymous is a sign of the rising pressure on Christians, as part of the general increase in oppression in Iran."

No sign of improvement in Iran

Despite being a signatory to the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, which enshrines religious freedoms, Iran is ranked number 9 on the Open Doors World Watch List of countries

where Christians face the most persecution for their faith.

While the constitution guarantees religious freedom for the ethnic Christian minorities such as Armenians, Iranian converts to Christianity face high levels of pressure involving social and legal discrimination, including prison sentences.

Despite these concerns, Christians in Iran know that all things are possible with God. Please join them in praying for religious freedom in the country, and for the men and women who are currently in prison for loving Jesus.

Please Pray

- For God to minister to His children in prison with love, mercy and comfort
- For religious freedom to improve during the new presidential term
- That the gospel should spread in Iran, and more Iranians hear the good news of Jesus Christ.

How many Christians are there in Iran

Almost everyone in Iran is Muslim – there are believed to be about 1.2 million Christians in a population of almost 87 million.

How are Christians persecuted in Iran

Conversion from Islam to Christianity is illegal in Iran, and anyone caught as a convert can be arrested and imprisoned. The authorities view conversion as an attempt by the West to undermine Islam and the Islamic government of Iran.

This means that anyone who is discovered to be a member of a house church can be charged with a crime against national security, which can lead to long prison sentences.

Anyone arrested or detained can be tortured and abused while in jail. Some Christians are released and monitored – and know a second arrest would mean a long prison sentence.



The Untold Story

Nothing's new!

Jude always did command most of the attention at home.

When he actually left, I have to admit there was quite a bit of relief in the household.

He and I were different from the word go. He just couldn't accept anything without questioning it.

I just got on with life and had few expectations.

We lived on a farm that was one of the few that actually made money. Dad was hard working and intelligent. He expected us boys to pull our weight but always told us of the rewards. He said frequently,

'All this is actually yours – so everything you give to it you will get back and more'

That made so much sense to me – but clearly not to Jude

My brother's heart was often elsewhere longing and dreaming of a better life as he put it.

He had friends in the city who he visited about twice a year and when he returned the last time, I knew something had changed. He began to dress differently and seemed even more distant than usual. His daily jobs were left half done and he even began to criticise Dad for the lack of new innovations on the farm. He seemed to be looking down on Dad.

It shocked me to hear his superior critical tone.

Dad was firm but patient with him which annoyed me. I thought he needed a good beating and there were times I got close to it. But it was not my place and I knew Dad was not one for that kind of reaction

So, I just seethed silently much of the time and went back out to the fields.

Some of the farm labourers had become my friends. They worked hard and appreciated the generous wages that the farm provided.

Dad even gave them accommodation in one of the barns. It was basic but met their needs. Sometimes they felt more like my family and I often used the barn to relax after work and eat with them.

They were uncomplicated and sometimes I was even envious of their responsibility-free lives as hired hands.

One summer evening I heard a commotion from the house.

Jude was shouting at Dad.... something about money and freedom then it went very quiet.

I walked over to make sure Dad was OK.

As I walked in the kitchen, he was handing over a leather pouch full of money to Jude who was red faced and breathing fast.

It was horribly tense and Dad was clearly upset.

Through his tears he said to Jude

'Take it – it's yours anyway. I hoped that you would plough it back in to our home – but you are an adult and you are free to do with this inheritance whatever you want'

And that was it. He was gone without a backward glance.

Clutching the pouch and a bag of clothes he disappeared down the path and through the gate. Dad even followed him to watch his fading form head towards the city.

I was in shock at Jude's audacity at taking off like this. And angry. So angry at his selfish greed and his rejection of us. I knew he would waste the money and I hated him for his lazy lack of principles and the advantage he had taken of Dad and me. We, his own family who were working so hard all our days. Never a word of appreciation from him ever even when I had to do his jobs for him.

I saw Dad leaning sadly on the gate much later that evening. Had he even moved I wondered? Though I knew him to be a man of great generosity and integrity.... I could not help judging him at that moment.... as weak and somewhat foolish.

It became a familiar sight. The back of an old man leaning on the gate peering into the distance. In the evenings he often came to find me. All he wanted was to talk about Jude – showing me photos of when we were young and recounting stories of our escapades. But I

honestly couldn't be bothered with it and began to avoid him and spent more time with my own friends outside.

There was more work than ever on the farm and I couldn't help the growing resentment in my heart.

I just didn't feel the loss. To be honest I felt like I just had to keep working so that I could somehow guarantee my share of the inheritance.... and prove to Dad that I was worthy of it.

In the back of my mind, I wondered if my brother's actions might affect what I was due.

Months passed.

Seasons came and went.

Every evening Dad waited by the gate.

One chilly autumn evening I heard Dad shouting my name outside in the yard. I was in the barn and rushed out in time to see Dad hitching up his robe and running out of the gate. He was shouting to a ragged figure toiling up the road. I stopped in my tracks — and watched with a sinking in my stomach as I saw them embrace.... dad wrapping his big old arms around what looked like a vagabond.

As they came through the gate into the farm, I hid behind a hedge so I didn't have to pretend to be happy. The conversation I overheard was one that threw me into a bitter turmoil.

Jude was saying,

'Dad I know I don't deserve any favours – I've really messed up my life but I'm penniless and hungry and don't know where else to turn. I'll gladly come and work for you as a labourer but I know I can't come back as a son because of what I've done'.

I was happy to hear him so down and out. It was entirely appropriate to expect the minimum mercy.

But what happened next shocked me to the core.

Dad called to the servants in the barn to go and get Jude a new robe, a ring and some sandals... and prepare a fatted calf so we could all celebrate his return.

I watched the bizarre scene unfold from my hiding place. Over his filthy stinking body Dad placed the robe and on his dirty hands he placed the ring and on the grimiest feet he put on the sandals.

With tears of joy running down his face he made this shocking announcement to the household

'Let's eat and be merry for this son of mine was dead and has come to life again – he was lost and now he is found'

The sheer injustice of it hit me like a truck. Nausea rose in the pit of my stomach.

I fled and hid away in the back of the barn out of sight.

Later I hear music and soon the door of the barn opens. One of the hired labourers is looking for me with a message from Dad to come join the party. Rage is consuming me and I can barely speak. Then Dad appears at the barn door and is entreating me to come to the celebration.

I cannot contain the flood of bitterness that spills out as I spit these words into his face.

'I've been slaving away for years for you and I've done everything you asked me and you've never even given me a small goat so I could have a party with my friends... but... but... this son of yours who squandered everything and has been with prostitutes – you've killed the fatted calf for him. You have been so grossly unfair!! ... So, No No No No — I will not celebrate this homecoming... just leave me alone'

Silence falls in the barn as the words hang heavily in the air.

Dad moves towards me and puts his hand on my shoulder.

He shakes his head and says softly:

'My child... you are always with me and all that is mine is yours. But it is necessary for us to rejoice because this brother of yours was dead and has begun to live. He was lost and now is found'

I am rooted silently to the spot, my throat tightening and my breath rasping...

With a heavy heart I watch him leave.

Slumping heavily on to a hay bale I cry. Angry sad hot tears... wailing from somewhere deep in my belly like an abandoned child.

Still my feet refuse to carry me to the party.

It's been a few months now. He's a lot different from the old Jude I have to admit.

He and Dad are closer and Jude seems content to help him run the farm and the business. They seem to spend hours talking and laughing and eating together.

I push it all to the back of my mind but every so often that fatted calf incident comes to mind and my blood still boils. When I see Jude in his robe and sandals and the ring flashing on his finger a cold mist covers my heart and bitter thoughts rise like bile.

'Why does he have to swan about in a robe all day? I don't wear mine... or my ring and sandals because I'm working hard all day and its not appropriate. I'd rather wear what the slaves are wearing. Yes, I am his son but I don't have to advertise it. I'm just as happy being with the servants in the barn...'

Come to think of it... I don't even know where my sandals are any more... it's such a long time since I wore them. My robe is wrapped up somewhere safe... and my ring is in my old bedroom in a box.

Tomorrow is the one-year anniversary of Jude coming home and Dad wants us to eat together and have another celebration.

I make my excuses and decide to take the day off and get away. They are disappointed ...but not surprised. They both try to get close to me but something in me cannot make the move back.

I'm going to walk to a nearby river and have a swim and relax.....by myself.

I'm choosing solitude more these days.

As I get nearer to the river, I hear a noise coming from down the bank. Peering down there's a sheep with an unusually heavy fleece tangled up in some bushes.

She's making the occasional weak bleat so I climb down and with

my knife and begin to cut away the dirty overgrown fleece to free her. As I do, she slides down to the water's edge and eagerly drinks from the flowing water.

I watch as she slowly revives. It's a good feeling – to rescue life.

I wonder how she got in such a bad state.

Clearly the local shepherd is not doing his job.

Into the quiet of the countryside comes a repeating call. It's a man shouting out a strange name.

I scramble up the bank and see the local shepherd who I've actually known all my life.

'I think your lost sheep is down here near the water' I tell him. 'She was caught by her fleece but I managed to cut her free'

His face breaks out into a huge smile of relief as he thanks me profusely for rescuing his naughty Hepzibah as he calls her.

Hepzibah?

I ask him why her fleece is in such a mess and why she is straying so far from the flock.

He sighs deeply and sits down on a tree stump holding my gaze with his piercing eyes.

"I've been a shepherd all my life and, in every flock, there always is one — or two... who just seem to want to do their own thing. Hepzibah has been mine since a lamb but she is never content with the grass I lead her to. She always wants to go in the next field and gets stuck in hedges and fences all the time. She kicks up a fuss at fleecing time and runs off... she doesn't realise the cut will make her feel better. So, she's full of ticks and itchy bites and very uncomfortable. Quite often I have to leave the flock in the pen and come searching — like today."

"Why do you keep her?" I ask. "You have about a hundred others. You could save yourself a lot of trouble if you just left her to her own devices. She doesn't deserve your care. She's only a sheep after all "

The shepherd looks at me quizzically. Then at Hepzibah who is munching grass nearby.

"I am a good shepherd and I will always go looking for a lost sheep. Just like a father with a lost son I will never give up looking until they are home. This is MY Hepzibah – she was lost and now she is found. The other sheep have always been mine and have all the pasture they want – but every time Hepzibah wanders and is found... I always rejoice. And by the way thank you for being a part of her rescue this time"

I am pierced by his eyes but his words are cutting deep into my heart.

Because they are a repeat of my Dad's words in the barn that day.

And his eyes are full of the same look of love.

At this moment something is happening to me deep on the inside.

There's a veil being lifted from my eyes.

Like the dawn rising after an endless night.

I see.

Lunderstand.

I'm waking up.

Although I was born into a family... I have never owned my heritage. Never really known my Dad. Or even wanted to.

Never owned my family's name or status.

Living on the outside looking in. Missing out on the very heart and purpose of being alive and belonging.

Never seeing the meaning or the full destiny of my life as part of an eternal plan.

Living in a barn when I could be fully at home in the house.

I am pierced to the heart by the realisation that I too have done what Jude has done... only worse. My heart and mind had left Dad years ago... but I had stayed nearby... using hard work to make sure I earned my inheritance.

The shepherd is staring at me and asking me if I'm okay. There are silent tears rolling down my face as I whisper out loud my Dad's words on the night of the homecoming celebration...

"But my child – you have always been with me – and everything I have is yours"

At that moment Hepzibah climbs out of the water, struggles up the bank and lays down at our feet.

The walk back home is like being in a dream. I'm mourning for the lost years... then crying with joy at the prospect of restoration with my Dad... and Jude. I've witnessed the grace with which Jude was received back... I know I have nothing to fear.

That kind of grace from Dad.... I know it has no limits.

Jude has paved the way for me to see that first hand.

The music from the party reaches my ears from half a mile away. I'm nervous and excited to enter into what I know was going to be a whole new life.

I approach the farm door and catch my breath as I see something familiar on a chair next to the door.

It's my robe.

I lift it up and see that underneath are my sandals.

I put them on.

It's been so long but they still fit.

The robe is so beautiful and has lost none of its colour or richness.

I knock at the door.

I know I could go straight in..... but it feels right to have the door opened to me from the inside.

Dad and Jude are both standing there with arms wide open

'Only one thing missing' says Dad

As he slips the ring on to my finger

And they both hug me very tightly.
