I have just returned from the Council Meeting of Evangelical Alliance, which was at High Leigh Conference Christian Centre, near Hoddesdon, Hertfordshire. It was an incredibly valuable 24 hour gathering where we focussed mainly on the challenges facing leaders in the modern world.

Gavin Calver the CEO wrote online this week:

"What a joy it has been to be together with our council these past two days. They exist to help and support us and speak into the work of the Evangelical Alliance. This amazing group of people consists of 70 evangelical leaders from all different spheres of society and places across the UK.

As we met this week, we were looking at leadership and how to do this healthily in our day. I am so grateful to all those who attended. Do pray for our council and the amazing contribution they make throughout the year.

It has been a privilege to serve among this amazing group of leaders, some of whom have grown to become true friends over the eight or more years I have been involved. There is such a breadth of experience in the room, and it is a delight to chat to people around the tables and over coffees and meals and hear what God is doing across the church in the four home nations. Council members are drawn from all manner of church streams as well as para-church organisations, charities, industry as well as politics and the media.

Shanklin URC is a member of EA – one of about 3,000 UK congregations which belong to the Alliance. It was really encouraging to hear that around 5,000 personal members have joined over the last 12 months, making some 25,000 individuals or couples in total.

It is good to stand together with like-minded folk who share similar biblical values and have a passion to reach the lost in our nation. The greater the membership, the more influence the team have in representing believers across the UK.

Do please pray for leaders in today's church and in Christian organisations, as well as fellow believers who carry such responsibilities in the secular world. There are all kinds of new pressures developing in modern society, and the spotlight is very much on those who lead, with so many stories of bad management and abuse in the press.

Do please pray for our leadership team as we seek to oversee the work in Shanklin and seek to serve the needs of the congregation and wider community. The Church Members elected each of the Elders and gave a promise of support when they were inducted to serve. Many issues we face are complex and challenging, and we need your love and support as we seek to do the right things at each juncture.

We plan to have a day together in early November to allow more time for reflection and team building. Please pray that this will be a good time of growing in relationship and effective leadership.

Olio

I've recently come across this sharing app called Olio I wanted to let others know about.

Most supermarkets nowadays have a system whereby charities can pick up food that is going to be thrown away, because it expires that day and they are no longer able to sell it. However, there are some occasions when



the charities either don't want certain items or for some reason are unable to collect that day, so rather than the food being binned, an Olio volunteer picks it up and posts it on the app for anyone to collect.

Their moto is 'Share More, Waste Less'.

You can choose where you pick up from, I pick up from 3 addresses in the centre of Shanklin and I have had some fabulous items and all for free. They often have baguettes, rolls, pastries, various vegetables, fruit and herbs plus some things I have never heard of. I've recently been introduced to samphire! Very tasty.

As I say the food is all free, all you have to do is commit to collect it. As Christians it is so important we help reduce food waste and that we are good stewards of all God has given to us.

Joining is really easy, just go to your app store, download the Olio app, select how far you are prepared to travel to collect items and you will be notified when items become available. You request what you would like, and arrange a time of collection and as I say it is all free.


The need is great, and the local believers do not have the resources to provide sufficient.

Last time we considered what type of people we are. In the devotional below Neil speaks of how we have become who we are. Neil bases his Freedom in Christ course around the fact that "*In Christ, we are accepted significant and secure*" and gives below the Biblical truths to support the statement.

Our Essential Identity

Then God said, "Let Us make man in Our image, according to Our likeness" (Genesis 1:26)

Adam was created physically and spiritually alive. He possessed eternal life from his first breath and enjoyed God's abiding presence in the Garden of Eden.

Furthermore, unlike the animal kingdom, which operated by divine instinct, Adam was created in the likeness of God with a mind, emotions, and will, giving him the ability to think, feel, and choose. No other created being can make that claim.

After creating Adam, God said, "It is not good for the man to be alone" (Genesis 2:18). So, He created a suitable helper for him: Eve. They both enjoyed a sense of belonging to God and each other. Not only that, but God also gave them a purpose to "rule over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the sky and over the cattle and over all the earth" (Genesis 1:26). Adam and Eve didn't have to search for significance; they had it in their relationship with God. And because God was present with them, they lived in perpetual safety and security.

Eternal life, identity, purpose, significance, security and a sense of

belonging are all attributes of mankind created in the image of God. Adam and Eve experienced these attributes in full measure, and we were destined to enjoy them too.

But when Adam sinned, he died spiritually and forfeited everything God had provided. Being separated from God, Adam's glowing attributes became glaring needs. As children of Adam, born separated from God, we come into the world with these same glaring needs. We wander through life striving to make a name for ourselves, looking for security in temporal things, and searching for significance apart from God.

Is it a hopeless quest? No! We can fulfil these needs by establishing a personal relationship with God through faith in Jesus Christ. **Everything Adam Enjoyed In The Garden Before He Sinned Is Now At Our Disposal.**

Loving heavenly Father, thank You for sending Jesus to die for my sin so I may have eternal life. Thank You that in Christ my need for identity, significance, security and a sense of belonging can be met.

Answer to Prayer...

King Charles III backs Bible Society

We are thrilled and so thankful that King Charles III has stepped into his mother's shoes and become the Bible Society's Patron.

The Society has had a Royal patron since 1943, when King George VI and Queen Elizabeth became joint patrons. Queen Elizabeth II was our sole Patron from 1952, when she acceded to the throne and since succeeding her, King Charles III has continued to donate to Bible Society from the Privy Purse. Our royal connections go back even further though, to when Queen Victoria became a member of the Society in 1838.

King Charles said he would be 'delighted to accept the patronage of Bible Society'. He has said that his faith is 'deeply rooted' in the Church of England and told faith leaders on his accession to the throne that he was 'a committed Anglican Christian', and promised at his Coronation to 'maintain the Laws of God and the true profession of the gospel'.

The King was a guest of Bible Society's president, His Eminence Archbishop Angaelos at the Coptic Orthodox Centre in Hertfordshire recently. Archbishop Angaelos introduced the King to Bible Society's Chief Executive, Paul Williams. They talked about Bible mission around the world, and the King asked especially about our work in the Middle East.

Paul said, "We're absolutely delighted with this news and very thankful. The King's patronage is a sign that the Bible is being taken seriously at the heart of our country's life, and we're so pleased that the connection with the royal family, which meant so much to us under Queen Elizabeth II, is to continue.

Please Pray

- Give thanks to the Lord that King Charles has given Bible Society his backing. Pray that this example will be noted by, and influence, many.
- Pray for the King's health, and for the health of Catherine, Princess of Wales, both of whom were diagnosed with cancer.

Pray that they will turn to Jesus for the greatest comfort there is.

• Pray for each member of the royal family, that they will treasure God's word and put their faith in Jesus.

PS How Bible a Month is supporting Christians in Cairo's Garbage Village

The people living in what is called the Garbage village of Cairo are the city's rubbish collectors. They collect rubbish from across the city and bring it back to their neighbourhood, or even their homes, to be processed. They're desperately poor, sometimes being paid as little as 30p a month per residence for collecting all of their rubbish.

Many of these people are also Christians. As we passed through the streets on our way to the Cave Church complex where they worship, we saw crosses and pictures of Jesus pinned to the walls. And their faith has been strengthened year after year thanks to your kind giving. Not only are you giving them Scriptures, but you're also enabling the training of Bible study group leaders so they can engage with God's word more deeply.

There are estimated to be about 15% of Egypt's population who are Christian (about 9.8 million souls). Life is not easy for the Christian community who face pressures of various kinds in their society.

In this environment the Bible is bringing life and hope to many.

<u>Bible a Month</u> is a wonderful ministry – a gift monthly will provide a Bible somewhere in the world to those who would otherwise have no access to God's word.

How a gift of motorbikes shows Christians in the Côte d'Ivoire they're not alone

Christians in far-flung parts of the Côte d'Ivoire can now know they're part of a wider community – thanks to a gift of motorbikes from Open Doors, meaning pastors can more easily visit these vulnerable believers.

Being part of a community of believers is vital for converts to Christianity in the Côte d'Ivoire. In the west, east and south, these believers have often left a traditional religion to follow Jesus, while in the north many Christians have converted from Islam and face growing threat of jihadist activity. What these brothers and sisters have in common is isolation.

That isolation isn't solely rejection from members of the majority religion in their region – but literal isolation. Many live in far-flung parts of the country that are hard to access. It means this crucial presence ministry can be difficult to accomplish – until now.

Thanks to gifts and prayers, Open Doors local partners were able to recently give motorcycles to seven local evangelists who serve remote churches in the Côte d'Ivoire. For many of the evangelists, this support was an answer to ongoing prayer.

Joyful motorcyclists

"I had difficulties in reaching these churches," shares Pastor Tahe Alexis. "To even go and greet the brothers and sisters, to make a pastoral visit, was very difficult. Since our arrival in this region, it has been a prayer point which we kept asking the Lord to do something about it."

Pastor Blé Bai Laurent agrees: "I have difficulties to move around since the believers are far away. Some are in encampments, others are in villages which are very far away from the main road, and to reach there is difficult. Sometimes I travel by bicycle and, once it rains, it's no longer possible.

"I say thanks today to the brothers and sisters who offered me a motorbike so that I can move around easily. I believe it will boost my ministry mostly in encampments and far away villages."

"This dream became reality"

The same joy is shared by another recipient, Emmanuel Hien: "Tiredness will be less and moving will be easy now thanks to this motorbike. I really don't know what to say: this dream became reality, thanks to my brothers and sisters. I can just say thank you; may God bless you. May God bless you abundantly."

Because of these motorcycles, believers in especially isolated areas will be visited more often and reminded that they are never alone. This is so important. Thank you.

Much like other countries in West Africa, Côte d'Ivoire faces an escalating threat from Islamic militants. In the northern regions, the growing influence of Muslims in politics and economics is palpable. This has led to a climate where Christians increasingly feel marginalised and insecure.

While Christianity makes up 39.8% of the Côte d'Ivoire, converts from Islam or a traditional religion face pressure and persecution from their families and communities. Jihadist activity at the border regions is increasing – the Côte d'Ivoire isn't the epicentre of the extremist violence in sub-Saharan Africa but, as this violence grows, the nation is coming under greater threat. Please keep praying.

How many Christians are there?

According to the 2021 census, the country has a total population of 29.4 million, of which 42.5 percent are Muslim and 39.8 percent Christian. An additional 12.6% of the population identified as irreligious, while 2.2% reported following animism (traditional African religions).

Main Persecution

The hostility facing Christians is multifaceted, with Islamic oppression and Clan oppression posing threats to all categories of Christian communities, with significant risks to converts with a background in Islam or traditional African religions (ATR). Converts living with non-Christian family members can experience severe opposition if their conversion becomes known. The region is also grappling with jihadist expansion.

"God is not a God of disappointment": ministry is bearing fruit in China

Being a Christian in China comes at great cost for every believer. The state heavily monitors religious practice, even online, and Christians can be arrested and imprisoned for running house churches. But it's even harder if you've converted from another faith.

Hollace^{*} is a local Open Doors partner in the north west of China. His ministry is to believers from a Muslim background, who face persecution both from the Chinese authorities and from those who feel they've betrayed Islam. He witnesses very hard things, but is seeing God's goodness too. In a recent letter to Open Doors supporters, he shared praise and thanksgiving.

"I am grateful that our work is not in vain," he writes. "Leaders I paid visits to previously were afraid of being tracked and monitored, so they laid low, and we did stop meeting each other. But God is not a God of disappointment, and everything happens according to His time."

His presence ministry is showing fruit. Local leaders of the underground church are keen to meet with him again, receiving prayer and encouragement.

A biblical ministry against domestic violence

A particular issue in the region is domestic violence, and local believers are increasingly keen to equip themselves to speak and act against this damaging trend.

"It is commonplace for domestic violence to take place in the family. Husbands beating up their wives is seen as normal and accepted in their culture," says Hollace. "There is a timely need to preach the biblical value based on the Word so more families can be renewed and transformed by adopting healthy and right values." Hollace is pleased to share that this need is being met. He says: "Three pairs of couples whom I used to visit regularly have come to me to express their interest lately! They want to be trained and equipped to serve in the family and marriage field."

Thank you – and keep praying

"We praise God for answering prayers and for this marvellous change," adds Yingfei*, another Open Doors partner in the region. "Thank you for the prayers from the Open Doors family and the supporters. More people are willing to rise to serve, even though the space is narrowing.

"As the Bible says, 'For the word of God is alive and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart.' (Hebrews 4:12) The Word is sharper than any two-edged sword, and it has a living power in it."

Yingfei adds: "Please join us in prayers that more couples in Hollace's area can hear the Word of God and may the transforming power work inside their hearts and souls."

Persecution survival training

In central China, meanwhile, Open Doors partners recently provided three-day persecution survival training to about 50 church leaders and church workers. While persecution of Christians is widespread in China, many believers are unaware and ill-prepared for it until they experience this persecution.

"This is very much needed in the church," explains Guo*, the local partner who helped facilitate the training. "Many churches are experiencing different types and levels of persecution, yet they do not know how to respond."

"Learning ways of responding to persecution resonates with me a lot and is essential to believers," shares Zicheng*, one of the participants in this training. "It's also crucial to learn about who God is, the position of His church, and the divine resources He has given to His children. We need to equip ourselves well with His word, so we can take up our spiritual weapons to fight the spiritual battles."

"We need to depend on His love"

"In the midst of persecution, we particularly need to depend on His

love to endure, persist, and forgive," adds another participant, Yunlong*, while a believer called Weihao* says, "I was particularly reminded of the significance of watching and praying so that we will not fall into temptation."

Open Doors partners continue to develop this training to incorporate more localised examples, so that it can relate even more closely to the experiences of Chinese believers' everyday lives. "Pray that this set of teaching can bring impact and transformation to their lives," asks Yingfei.

Praise God for the blessings He is pouring on His children in China, as they face such opposition, surveillance and persecution. Please join the Chinese church in asking to be daily transformed into His likeness.

How many Christians are there in China?

There are around 96.7 million Christians in China – a huge number, but less than seven per cent of China's total population of around 1.5 billion.

How are Christians persecuted in China?

The most overt persecution in China often takes place in regions where Buddhism or Islam are the majority religions. Anyone who converts to Christianity is seen as a traitor to their ethnicity and family. These believers may be threatened or even harmed, all in an attempt to convince them to return to the family's religion.

However, persecution and discrimination are slowly spreading throughout most of China. The Chinese Communist Party's goal is to make sure churches don't fall out of line with official viewpoints: In the case of official churches, this means they are encouraged to praise and pledge allegiance to the Communist Party and its ideology. Churches that claim Christ as King are viewed with suspicion, especially since Christianity is seen as a primarily Western influence. It's always been true that house churches exist in a legal grey area, where they are unregistered and technically not allowed, but largely tolerated. New regulations continue to chip away at this status quo. Children under 18 continue to be forbidden from attending church. Most churches are monitored and can be shut down without warning.

Digital persecution also impacts the church in China. Restrictions passed in 2018 as part of a wide-ranging law on religion have made it harder for Christians to use the internet or social media to pursue their faith. The government's growing authoritarianism means that every Chinese citizen can be sure that none of their digital footprint is out of the state's view. Christian chat groups are routinely shut down, and the government's sophisticated surveillance system has been rolled out to target minority groups in some regions. Observers fear this technology will increasingly be used to target Christians, especially those in house churches.

Is it getting easier to be a Christian in China?

While China fell three places to number 19 on the World Watch List, the persecution score actually rose by one point. The reason that it fell is because persecution increased in other countries.

Over the last five years, the situation in China has slowly and steadily deteriorated, and the past 12 months was no exception. While violence against believers remained rare, church closures and raids continue to happen, with pressure across all parts of life steadily rising. This year, the government passed regulations requiring churches in one region to post signs that read, 'Love the Communist Party; Love the country; Love the religion'. While this law only impacts state-sanctioned churches and implementation seems uneven, house church leaders are increasingly worried about crackdowns. In one province, citizens were required to use a statecontrolled smartphone app to register before they attended religious services. And the ongoing digital pressure continues to increase as China exerts its control over citizens' lives.

Ruth - Israel's Only Friend

"Do not urge me to leave you or turn back from following you; for where you go, I will go, and where you lodge, I will lodge. Your people shall be my people, and your God, my God. Where you die, I will die, and there I will be buried. Thus, may the Lord do to me, and worse, if anything but death parts you and me." (Ruth 1:16)

The Deeper The Darkness - The Brighter The Light

Concerning the end of this age and the planet's transition into the Kingdom Reign, the Spirit says to Israel and to God's children, "Arise, shine; for your light has come! And the glory of Yahweh is risen upon you. For behold, the darkness shall cover the earth, and deep darkness the people; but Yahweh will arise over you, and His glory will be seen upon you..." (Isaiah 60).

The Word of God offers us rich prophetic images to convey truths hidden deep in His heart. These treasures are concealed so that only the humble and the hungry could perceive and embrace them. The pictures are like doors, inviting the faithful to enter deeper into the reality of God and to share in His works. The story of Ruth is one such picture, depicting the end-time role of the true Ecclesia Church in the restoration of Israel. In this story, every detail is meaningful; every name prophetic.

This ancient story unfolds during the days of the Judges nearly a century after the twelve Tribes of Israel took possession of the Promised Land. It was a time of national and social chaos in Israel, with only temporary periods of peace when God's judges led the people. As famine plagued the land of Judah, a family from "**Bethlehem**," meaning "**House of Bread**" in Hebrew, left home and travelled east across the Jordan Valley to sojourn in the land of Moab, the neighbouring pagan society.

Contrary to the Law of Moses, this small family of four left their inheritance to look for provisions among the Gentiles. The head of the household, "**Eli-Melech**," which in Hebrew means "**My God is King**," soon died. Their two sons died as well, fulfilling their own prophetic names, "**Mahlon**" and "**Chilion**." In the Hebrew language, their names mean "**Sickness**" and "**Annihilation**."

Sickness and annihilation were two of the curses pronounced by

Moses over the Israelites if they would leave the Land God gave them to sojourn among the pagan nations. God intended for the children of Israel to dwell in the Land He gave them, and any deviation from the plan had negative consequences.

"**Naomi**," now a widowed wife and a grieving mother, is the main character of our story. Prophetically, she stands for the nation of Israel that, because of spiritual famine and drought, had left their land to sojourn among the nations. Distant from her homeland, cut off from the covering of "**Eli-Melech**," her husband God-King, and without the promise of future generations, Naomi is left with her two Gentile daughters-in-law.

The name of the first is "**Orpah**," meaning "**The back of one's neck**." The name of the second is "Ruth," meaning "**A Friend**." These two young Gentile women prophetically typify two kinds of churches that will join Naomi's story at the end of the age.

The first one will not be able to leave her own people but will instead turn her back on Israel when she needs her the most. The second will pass the test of loyalty and become Naomi's only friend, only to find her new life and destiny awaiting her in the fields of Bethlehem. Both of these Gentile women were married into the covenant, but only one would live up to her vows.

Test of Devotion

Good news travel fast, and word came to Naomi that the famine in Judah was over. Having no reason to stay any longer in the land of Moab, she prepared for her return to Bethlehem. It was at this juncture of the story that both her daughters-in-law were to fulfil their prophetic names.

Orpah will walk away from Naomi in her hour of need and vanish from the pages of history. Ruth will become a true friend, join the unfolding plan of God, and share in the bloodline of Messiah. Their eternal destinies were triggered by their loyalty to Naomi.

Traveling west to Judea, Naomi pleaded with them three times, saying, "**Go, return each to her mother's house. May Yahweh deal kindly with you, as you have dealt with the dead and with me**." (Ruth 1:8). Following Naomi's third attempt to discourage them, Orpah yielded, kissed Naomi goodbye, and turned her back on her. Ruth continued on.

This part of the story is the foundation to an ancient Jewish tradition which stipulates that every Gentile who desires to follow Yahweh and join the house of Israel must be "discouraged" from doing so three times. It was done to test their commitment and devotion in order to avoid false and failed conversions.

Orpah wasn't ready to make the sacrifice and go through the social, cultural, and spiritual transformation. The Scripture says that she went back "to her people and to her Gods." (Ruth 1:15). Ruth, on the other hand, withstood the temptation to hang on to her old life and passed the test of loyalty.

It was at this part of the story that Ruth spoke these famous words, "Do not urge me to leave you or turn back from following you; for where you go, I will go, and where you lodge, I will lodge. Your people shall be my people, and your God, my God." (Ruth 1:16). Unlike Orpah who returned "to her people and to her Gods," Ruth made a clear confession of her commitment not only to her mother-in-law and her people, but also to Naomi's God.

Their story emphasises both the promise and the risk connected to one's attitude about the people of Israel. This irrevocable principle is not because the people of Israel are better or more worthy than other people groups. Rather, it is because of God's election and purpose. Israel is the only nation on earth that carries God's name in her name, Isra-el, and anyone who desire to join the God of Israel must also embrace the (imperfect) people of Israel. It is a "package deal," and it is a test.

This biblical analogy of Israel returning to her homeland after a long exile, widowed and grieving over her lost sons, speaks to those with eyes to see and ears to hear. As the Apostle wrote long ago, "**these things happened to them as an example, and they were written for our instruction, upon whom the ends of the ages have come**." (1-Corinthians 10:11).

Ruth continued her great confession, "Where you die, I will die, and there I will be buried. Thus, may the Lord do to me, and worse, if anything but death parts you and me." (Ruth 1:17). Today, we often hear these beautiful words during marriage ceremonies, demonstrating the depth of devotion and commitment between husband and wife. However, these words were originally spoken between two women. One was born into the Covenant of God; the second joined into it through marriage and friendship.

Homebound

As the two weary travellers crossed the wilderness separating Moab from Judea and arrived at Bethlehem, it was at "**the beginning of the barley harvest**." (Ruth 1:22). The timing is significant since the natural harvest points to the spiritual harvest when Jew and Gentile, in one spirit, serve side by side during God's final harvest of souls before the end of this age.

The status of the two women was that of refugees at the very bottom of society as both were widows and childless. Naomi's possessions and property were long lost. Ruth was an unwelcomed Gentile, and their only livelihood consisted of gleaning at the fields of kind strangers.

The old Jewess who returned home from exile empty handed and broken-hearted changed her name from Naomi, which means "Pleasant," to "Mara," which in Hebrew means "Bitter." Answering the puzzled women who met them in Bethlehem, Naomi said, "Do not call me Naomi; call me Mara, for the Almighty has dealt very bitterly with me... Why do you call me Naomi, since the Lord has witnessed against me and the Almighty has afflicted me?" (Ruth 1:20-21).

Though the homecoming was necessary for the rest of the story to unfold, the dire conditions and great loss overwhelmed Naomi's soul. She now became **Mara**, an abandoned widow without God and without a future. The **only** bright light in her life was Ruth.

Redemption

The prophetic story unfolds as Ruth finds herself gleaning in the fields of a community noble named "**Boaz**." The name Boaz is a blend of two Hebrew words, **Bo** and **Az**, meaning "**In Him there is Strength**." Mentioned by name 13 times in our story, Boaz is the Kinsman-Redeemer who, according to the Law of Moses, was legally authorised to perform the act of redemption for Naomi's family. In this prophetic picture, Boaz stands for Yeshua, our Great and Eternal Kinsman-Redeemer.

According to the Law of Moses, the Kinsman-Redeemer not only had to be a blood relative of the family, but to also be socially available, morally willing, and financially prepared to pay the price of

redemption. Biblically, the Kinsman-Redeemer is the only person on earth who can redeem three eternal assets which, without him, would be forever lost:

- (1) The **name** of the deceased.
- (2) The **land** of the deceased.
- (3) The **bride** of the deceased.

Being unmarried, Boaz could restore the status, the honour, and the hope of Naomi's future generations by marrying Ruth, raising seed for her future, and assuming responsibility for the family lands.

The Bible tells us that Ruth's humility and commitment to her mother -in-law was the starting point of Boaz' attraction. Recognizing her virtues, he offered Ruth preferential treatment and protection while gleaning in his fields. He said, **"All that you have done for your mother-in-law after the death of your husband has been fully reported to me..."** (Ruth 2:11). It was Ruth's kindness and commitment to old and embittered Naomi that now became her greatest asset.

The story moves on quickly and the prophetic scenario reaches its climax as Ruth captures the Redeemer's heart. The unfolding of their love reveals another prophetic mystery. The Bible says that old and bitter Naomi offered young Ruth counsel and instruction for her emerging romance with Boaz.

She told her, "Wash yourself therefore, and anoint yourself, and put on your best clothes, and go down to the threshing floor... go and uncover his feet and lie down; then he will tell you what you shall do." (Ruth 3:3-4). Shattered by life and embittered by hardship, Naomi could still give godly instruction to the young brideto-be as she approaches her beloved.

Naomi was right, and Ruth found her way into Boaz' heart. Moved and determined to fulfil his duty as Kinsman-Redeemer, Boaz had to pass his own test now. There was another relative more closely related to Naomi who was therefore "**first in line**" to redeem that which was lost.

Bringing this other relative before the elders of the city, Boaz gave him a choice, saying, "Naomi, who has come back from the country of Moab, sold the piece of land which belonged to our brother Eli-Melech. And I thought to inform you, saying, 'Buy it back in the presence of the inhabitants and the elders of my people. If you will redeem it, redeem it; but if you will not redeem it, then tell me, that I may know; for there is no one but you to redeem it, and I am next after you.' And he said, 'I will redeem it.'"

The story could have ended right there, but Boaz continued, "'On the day you buy the field from the hand of Naomi, you must also buy it from Ruth the Moabitess, the wife of the dead, to perpetuate the name of the dead through his inheritance.' And the close relative said, 'I cannot redeem it for myself, lest I ruin my own inheritance. You redeem my right of redemption for yourself, for I cannot redeem it.'" (Ruth 4).

Why did the closer relative yield his option? Because Ruth was a Moabitess. Marrying a Gentile was not common nor acceptable in Israel, and the social and cultural price was too high for him to pay. The story tells us that having the **right** to redeem was not enough. The Kinsman-Redeemer must also **want** to assume these responsibilities in order to gain the benefits. He needs to be willing to pay whatever price was needed to redeem the **name**, the **land**, and the **bride**.

The story is nearing its happy end with a special wedding in Bethlehem. The Bible says that Ruth "... became his wife, and he went into her. And the Lord enabled her to conceive, and she gave birth to a son." (Ruth 4:13). The important point to realise is that Ruth's womb was only now opened by the Lord. Remember, Ruth was not a virgin. She was a widow who had known a man before, yet bore no children.

Ruth's womb remained strategically closed until she married the right man, the Kinsman-Redeemer of Judah, who's seed will now produce the family's future generations. Likewise, the true Ecclesia Church, the Ruth of the nations, will bear spiritual children only when she is intimately united with the Kinsman-Redeemer, the Lord God of Israel.

The Seed

The story ends with a newborn son, but who is he in the prophetic picture? Who was this male child of whom the community said, "**A** son has been born to Naomi!" (Ruth 4:17). And why did they say

that old and lifeless Naomi now has a son? Boaz was not Naomi's husband, nor was it her womb that carried the infant for nine months and gave birth to the boy.

Still, the prophetic language suggests that the child was Naomi's. Could it be that young and loving Ruth offered her womb so that old and lifeless Naomi could have a son one last time? A healthy son who will be able to resurrect and preserve the family's name and blood line.

The women of Bethlehem gave us the answer, saying, "Blessed is the Lord who has not left you without a redeemer today... may he also be to you a restorer of life and a sustainer of your old age; for your daughter-in-law, who loves you and is better to you than seven sons, has given birth to him." (Ruth 4:14-15).

The scripture continues to say that "**Naomi took the child and laid him in her lap, and became his nurse.**" (Ruth 4:16). The Hebraic thought in this verse suggests the possibility that Naomi actually began to **Nurse the Child**. By miracle, the old lifeless breasts were refreshed and empowered to give life for the newborn child.

Who was this boy in our story? What name did they give him? The community named him, and "they called his name Obed. He is the father of Jesse, the father of David..." (Ruth 4:17). Obed means "Worker or Servant," one who does the will of him who sends him.

Born of the bloodline of Judah, the tribe of the Kings of Israel, Obed was the grandfather of King David. Born to an unusual Gentile-Jewish marriage, the son of Ruth and Boaz, Obed joined the genealogy that, a thousand years later, would produce the Messiah, the Son of the Living God, the Great Kinsman-Redeemer and Saviour of the world.

From Type to Reality

There is a young and loving church that God is calling these days to serve old struggling Israel. The God of all mercy and grace is calling her to offer her heart as a birthing chamber of travail for **Naomi** who became **Mara**. Israel is too old and exhausted to bear her last son, Obed, who will labour in the fields or harvest at the end of the age. Only Ruth can help.

The son who was born to Naomi, Obed, stands for Israel's final generation. The ancient nation, the timeless Olive Tree of God, is

destined to give birth one last time at the end of this age to a generation that will gather in the final harvest in preparation for the return of the Lord to Zion.

Hear this mystery: "We were pregnant, we writhed in labour, we gave birth, as it were, only to wind. We could not accomplish deliverance for the earth nor were the inhabitants of the world born." (Isaiah 26:18). This mysterious cry is Israel's historic trauma. The nation that was called to represent God, to proclaim His deliverance to the ends of the earth, and to be a blessing to all the families of mankind, is weeping with deep frustration.

All her labours, her sacrifice, and her suffering seem to have produced absolutely nothing. The six million who perished in the holocaust (1.5 million of them being children) brought no global deliverance, and 76 years of national hardships and warfare gave birth, as it were, only to wind. As Israel's present season of war and suffering continues on, these voices of frustration and doubt are getting louder each day.

To the undiscerning eye, Israel's historic saga of suffering and hardship bore no fruit. And yet, Isaiah's prophecy leads on into a victorious future, promising, "Your dead will live; their corpses will rise. You who lie in the dust, awake and shout for joy, for your dew is as the dew of the dawn, and the earth will give birth to the departed spirits." (Isaiah 26:19). The promise of national resurrection and of eternal life is anchored in God's Word, yet Ruth has an essential part of the story to fulfil.

Be a Ruth

Pray for the Spirit to come from the four corners of the earth and revive Ezekiel's Dry Bones. Pray for the Ecclesia Church to uphold Israel while she labours. Remember that in this prophetic story, Ruth found her Redeemer-Husband **only** when she joined herself to Naomi, to her people, to their God, and to their destiny. The bride of Messiah will unite with her Heavenly Bridegroom as she serves her Naomi, gleaning in the fields of Bethlehem.

Isaiah describes Israel's amazement as she beholds her children miraculously gathered unto her. "Then you will say in your heart, 'Who has begotten these for me, since I have been bereaved of my children, and am barren, an exile and a wanderer? And who has reared these? Behold, I was left alone; from where did

these come?'" (Isaiah 49:21). Israel is in need of a loving, life-giving young "womb" to birth her children. Will the end-time Ecclesia Church be an "**Orpah**" or a "**Ruth**?" A "**leaver**" or a "**cleaver**?"


The line of demarcation is being drawn as the days go darker for Israel and for God's elect. Global institutions, media, and godless governments are becoming more hostile by the day, and great wars are on the horizon. The stakes are high and the consequences are eternal.

Naomi is returning back home, leaning on Ruth's arm. The fields are white and ready for harvest while Boaz and his angels are working in the heat. Soon, Jew and Gentile, united in spirit and purposes, will give birth to Obed, the **One New Man** that will see the closing of this age. The greatest gift you can offer the partially blind people of Israel (see Romans 11:25) during these difficult times is acceptance and friendship. Be a **Ruth** wherever you can.


