The URC Wessex Synod has generously sponsored three Saturday events for local congregations to explore the resource - **Leading your Church into Growth** (LYCIG for short!). This is because they want churches to think actively about strategies for growth rather than simply managing decline!

This has been developed over a number of years in Anglican circles but one of my GEAR friends in Yorkshire has been pioneering it among URC congregations, mainly in the north. This has received much support and Rev Ashley Evans has recently led a dedicated URC residential gathering and has adapted the manual to better suit our context (removing parish language, etc).

This thought-provoking programme is in seven sections

- Creating a Prayerful Culture of Growth
- Implementing the 4Ps prayer, presence, proclamation and persuasion (this needs explaining!)
- Practising Fruitful Evangelism
- Developing Engaging Worship
- Becoming an Inviting and Welcoming Church
- Make a Pathway for Seekers to become Disciples
- Begin a Planned Journey of Growth

About 40 people, comprised of small groups from a number of congregations in our synod, packed into a hotel conference room in Salisbury led by two facilitators from up country. Yvonne and Ann F came with me to the first day in September and Alan joined myself and Yvonne for the second one in late November. We all got a lot from these sessions - spending time together working through some of the material and questions and chatting on the journeys. It was also good to connect with others from around the wider area.

The last of the three Saturdays is coming up on 8th February. Do pray for us as we travel over again and look at the last few topics.

It has been good to recognise the things that we do quite well, while taking seriously the challenge of seeing how we can do better in some areas. The prayer below, which I have introduced in both Island congregations, is an intentional way of embracing the mindset of positivity. It all depends on God, so we should always remember that we must seek the Lord who alone is the one who makes things grow (1 Corinthians 3:7).

As the series ends, we must pray about how we might use some of the ideas in this great material to help us move forward in this new year of opportunity. Do begin by praying the prayer regularly.

'Pop-Up' Community Food Pantry in Shanklin

What is it?

Aspire Ryde and the Living Well and Early Help Service currently run around 9 such pantries across the Island (some are popup and some permanent) and are currently trialling a pop-up in the church.



Elders have given approval to this, and we have agreed to 'host' them on Monday mornings ~ these will begin on 27^{th} January and will run weekly. We have agreed to open the church from 10:00 on Mondays... Abi & Charity (the pantry team) will park on the frontage and then set up 'crates' of non-perishable food and other household items on our tables inside the church.

All local residents and those from the surrounding areas may use the facility that will be open to clients between 10:30 and 12:00.

How it works

Folks who wish to use the pantry have to register (no fee) and may use one of the Island pantries once a week where, for a fee of $\pounds 5$, they get "15 points" to spend (roughly equivalent to $\pounds 15$) on whatever they choose (donated items are also available free of charge).

The scheme itself is funded by the HM Government Household Support fund which provides an additional £10 towards the individual cost for each person using the pantry.

<u>What we need</u>

Volunteers to open the building up for the pantry team by 10:00 and to provide teas and coffee for their clients between 10:30 am and 12:00, before closing the church at 12:30.

If you can help out on a rota, please speak to Brian, Robin or Tracy (or just turn up on a Monday!)

You can also help by not parking on our frontage on Mondays, thanks.

Testimony

My husband Ron and I have been together for forty-five years now, but it could have been so different last year if Father God had not been in our hearts and provided such amazing medics to look after him.

On the 14th February 2024 he collapsed in London, while out for a walk, from a cardiac arrest, pulling me down with him. A man stopped to help us backup but it was clear Ron needed an ambulance. once on my knees I thought, "I've got to try CPR," but it's one of those things you keep meaning to learn (<u>please</u> take a course).

I started opening his coat then I found myself on my feet but still can't remember getting up. Father God just took over because at that point I realised a new man had taken over from the other and was giving extremely good CPR, he broke thirteen of Ron's ribs. A lady was stood by me and I remember saying, "Thank you," and she said, "That's what we do." They were talking Spanish to each other. I have since found out that he was a paramedic from Scotland. God was in charge.

Police and ambulance arrived at some point and Peter our son and I were moved away to a police car and were looked after extremely well. I do remember looking over to the team with Ron and seeing them using the 'paddles', which meant it was serious. I don't remember praying at this point, I was in shock and trying to reassure Peter. I look back now and realise that once you have accepted God into your heart then He is always with you and doesn't let you go.

After approximately one hour Ron was taken to St Thomas' Hospital and he stayed there for a month. The first week was critical, there were tubes everywhere and white boxing gloves that looked like cats paws on his hands to stop him pulling the tubes out. He wasn't aware of the family who were coming and going.

We have three boys who were marvellous in bringing me clothes sorting out the money and taking notes when the doctor gave us information. The doctors were very patient with all our questions. I was given six free nights accommodation by the Critical Care team then I had to pay.

Ron gradually came out of sedation but was very confused. The

doctors seemed pleased with how he was responding. He had two stents and a defibrillator implanted, and he is still monitored at St Thomas'.

I found it very hard to pray at the time but Brian and Janet were a marvellous support and our prayer team were all praying, which was very comforting.

Father God provided all these trained people in everything that Ron needed for him to survive. We must trust Him and give Him the glory.

Shanklin URC Bookshop

It is planned that the church bookshop will reopen for 2025 sometime around mid-February (probably during school half-term week) but the date has still to be finalised. When the bookshop is open it provides an open door at times when the church building may be closed.

The bookshop stocks a selection of new books and bibles including some large print gospels and bibles. Previously owned books, which have been donated to us, are available at prices well below the original new price.

The bookshop also stocks a selection of greeting cards for special occasions, birthdays, anniversaries etc but also categories such as ' praying for you ' and ' God's blessing '. All our cards include a scripture verse and most of our greetings cards also support a Christian charity. Income from bookshop sales enables a transfer of funds to be made to the church at the end of each year.

As well as people coming into the bookshop to browse and perhaps buy something they sometimes call in just for a chat. People who come into the bookshop sometimes enquire about the church building next door so it can provide opportunities to let them know about the activities and services that are held in the church. Holidaymakers often say that they are pleased to find a Christian bookshop as they no longer have one in their home area.

The bookshop relies on a team of volunteers. Volunteers can serve on the team in a variety of ways; by doing a three hour session in the bookshop on a weekly basis or less frequently, e.g. once a month or by helping to provide occasional back-up cover to help ensure regular opening hours. If you would be interested in contributing to this aspect of the church ministry, by possibly joining the bookshop team, and would like to know more about what is involved, then please speak to John or Joan Dunkley (either at church or initially by e-mailing johndfrend@aol.com).

Already Accepted

Do you sometimes find it hard to be honest with God? I know I do! In this devotional Neil explores what it means as Christians, to have been **Already Accepted** and how we should respond...

"⁷If we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, his Son, purifies us from all sin. ⁸If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. ⁹If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness " (1 John 1: 7-9)

Fellowship with God is not an abstract theological concept, but a living relationship. Living in continuous agreement with God is to walk in the light (1 John 1:7). Satan can't accuse me if I live in the light, but walking in the light is not moral perfection (1 John 1:8). We are not sinless, but confession (1 John 1:9) brings us into agreement with God about our present moral condition before Him. What makes it possible to be this open with God about our condition is the fact that we are already His children. Our eternal state is not at stake, only our daily victory.

We don't have to pretend with God in the hope that He will accept us. As His children we're already accepted, so we are free to be honest with Him. We have no relationship to lose, only fellowship to gain. Knowing that we're secure in Christ, we can express ourselves honestly to Him. He already knows the thoughts and intentions of our hearts (Hebrews 4:12). Knowing that we are forgiven, let's come before His presence with thanksgiving.

God is our Father, and like any parent He doesn't appreciate

grumbling, complaining children, especially since this Father sacrificed His only begotten Son for us. He will not be very interested in our list of demands if we haven't been obedient to Him. I also don't think He is going to be very interested in helping us develop our own kingdoms when we are to work at establishing the only one that will last His!

To sit in the presence of my Father who loves me, who has made an incredible sacrifice so I can be there, doesn't have to be a dismal, failing experience. He invites us into His presence just as we are, because in Christ our weakness and sin have been covered: "Let us draw near with a sincere heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience" (Hebrews 10:22).

Thank You, God the Creator, that You have opened up the way for me to approach You and enjoy fellowship with You.

Open Doors World Watch List 2025 - The Highlights

> North Korea again number one

Since the first World Watch List in 1983, North Korea has been number one 23 times – that's almost 70% of the time. The persecution of our North Korean family has worsened in the last year following a rise in reported incidents of violence. It coincides with stricter regulations announced by the North Korean authorities in early 2024.

> 4,476 Christians killed worldwide

Last year, 4,476 believers worldwide were killed for their faith. Most were from Nigeria, with 3,100, which is fewer than 2023. However, other countries in sub-Saharan Africa have seen rising numbers of Christian deaths, including Burkina Faso, where 201 believers lost their lives – that's more than a fivefold increase on 2023.

> Kyrgyzstan biggest riser, jumping 14 places

There's been a rise in violence elsewhere in the world, including Central Asia, where churches and believers have been increasingly targeted as authoritarian governments seek to further repress religious freedom. No country rose further in this year's rankings than Kyrgyzstan, jumping 14 places to 47.

> 210,000 Christians driven from home

The last year has seen at least 209,771 Christians forced from their homes to go into hiding or exile because of the faith, almost half of whom are from Nigeria – and that's despite around half of all Nigerians being Christian. It reinforces the escalating dangers facing believers across sub-Saharan Africa because of rising extremism.

> Protestant churches targeted in Algeria

In 2023, almost all of Algeria's Protestant churches had been ordered to close. Last year, all remaining churches were closed or forced to stop regular services. Like other countries, such as Afghanistan and China, believers are having to be increasingly creative and courageous in how they gather – if at all.

> Heightened violence in Mexico

Mexico is number 31 – the highest it's been since 2005 and the only country in Latin America to rise in the latest rankings. Organised crime is rampant in many areas, and churches and believers who seek to counter it make themselves targets. There has been a jump in the number of believers killed and abducted.

- Trends

> Rising violence, from Burkina Faso to Kazakhstan

The most violent region is sub-Saharan Africa, where weak government and political tensions allow Islamic extremism to flourish. Persecution is rising in countries such as **Burkina Faso** (20) and **Mali** (14), a well as **Chad** (49), which enters the top 50 for the first time. Open Doors' ongoing *Arise Africa* campaign is a call to the church and the world to respond to this crisis.

Violence grows in situations of anarchy and internal conflict. Trapped in the chaos of civil war, Christians in **Yemen** (3), **Sudan** (5) and **Myanmar** (13) are easy targets.

But strong, authoritarian regimes are also places of officially sanctioned violence. In both **Kyrgyzstan** (47) – back in the top 50 for the first time since 2013 – and **Kazakhstan** (up nine places to 38), churches and believers have been attacked by police and security services, or through locally orchestrated mobs.

> Displaced church

The persecuted church is, increasingly, a displaced church, exiled to refugee or IDP (internally displaced people) camps. **Sudan** (5) is facing the largest displacement crisis in the world: in a country of 49 million people, the number of IDPs by mid-2024 had surpassed 7.7 million. For already vulnerable Christians, the loss of home and community makes them even more of an easy target. In **Nigeria** (7), radicalised Islamic Fulani militants continue to drive Christian communities from their lands. Conflict in the Manipur region in **India** (11) forced tens of thousands of Christians to flee for their lives – often with little more than the clothes on their back.

> Christians forced into the shadows

More and more Christians are having to worship undercover.

In **Afghanistan** (10), it is effectively impossible to publicly express your faith. In **Algeria** (19), all Protestant churches have been forced to close and the number of Christians awaiting trial and sentencing is at an all-time high. In **China** (15), the era of relative tolerance is over. Unregistered churches are now illegal. Ideological pressure and official indoctrination are used to direct church teaching. Religious education for children is banned. Many congregations are taking their fellowships underground, into isolated home groups. Meanwhile, in **Libya** (4), the small Christian community is extremely careful to avoid a repeat of the March 2023 crackdown that swept up numerous Christians for arrest.

> Brave Christians increasingly targeted in Mexico

Despite most of the country's population being Christian, many believers in Mexico have faced heightened levels of violence. In many parts, the presence of criminal groups is growing, and Christians who bravely speak out against are deemed a threat. The number of abductions, attacks on Christian properties and even deaths have risen in the past year. This deeply troubling trend coincides with what was a more of violent year, in general, for Mexico, following deadly protests in the run-up to the general election in the summer.

> What does the future hold for Syria?

During the World Watch List recording period, the main problem in Syria (18) was crime and corruption, which continued to drive Christian emigration. As this year's list was going to print, the Assad regime fell to rebel forces, leaving Christians in the church's ancient heartlands facing renewed anxiety and threat.

> An active and growing church

Despite destruction and displacement, tyranny and terror, the church is active and alive. Even in **North Korea** (1), the worst of all countries to be a Christian, some 400,000 believers still witness to the life and light of Jesus. As Lydia^{*}, a secret Open Doors fieldworker who supports North Korean believers outside the country says, "Despite persecution, nothing and no one can stop the church from growing."

Good News... for a change





loW Street Pastors are recruiting for more Street Pastors and Safe Space volunteers.

What we do:

• Care for people

Street Pastors provide care, support, and listen to people on the streets. They often help people who are homeless or at risk.

Respond to crime

Street Pastors work to help with crime and safety issues. They may also help with situations that the police can't prioritize.

Build relationships

Street Pastors get to know people in the community and build relationships with local businesses & door staff.

Work with partners

Street Pastors work with other partners to make communities safer. We work at events such as the IoW Festival, Pride, Scooter Rally, Cowes Week and Carnivals working alongside other partnerships like police, security and staff.

Eight months ago, we opened a Safe Space in Newport Bus Station in partnership with the police and Southern Vectis. The safe space is a place where people can wait for friends, get help with getting home, receive first aid, get advice and support or report Anti-Social Behaviour or any other concerns they have around feeling unsafe on a night out. This has been used very well by members of the public with an average of 14 plus people coming into the safe space every night it is open and there has been a noticeable reduction in crime and incidents in the bus station when the safe space is open.

We are recruiting for volunteers to be Street Pastors and/or to help man the Safe Space on a Friday or Saturday night between 21:00 -

01:00 (approx.) so it can open more regularly. We would require you to commit to at least one night a month but more is welcome. The Safe Space is manned by two people, at least one person would be a fully trained Street Pastor.

- We offer unconditional love and support, and don't judge or preach.
- We may answer questions about the Bible or God if asked, which we do on occasions.
- We show people how we care about the community to make it a safer and more desirable place to live and to be Jesus on the streets.

We would require a current DBS certificate, or we can apply for one if you do not have a transferrable one, and any training can be arranged. If you're only working in the Safe Space, you do not need to do the full Street Pastor training, we would just require Safeguarding and if you are First Aid trained then that is a bonus, or we can arrange this.

Street Pastors and the Safe Space is in great demand, with other areas of the Island needing Street Pastor patrols, currently we do Newport and Ryde. We are having to say 'no' to adding in any more patrols, events or nights the safe space is open until we increase the number of our volunteers.

What Happened Next?

After the birth of Jesus, Mary and Joseph stayed in Bethlehem. It was a 7 mile walk to Jerusalem, and that's where they went to present Jesus at the temple, with a a sacrifice of: "a pair of doves or two young pigeons."

The Holy Spirit had revealed to Simeon, that he would not die before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Moved by the Spirit, he went into the temple courts. When Joseph and Mary brought in the



child Jesus to do for him what the custom of the Law required, Simeon took Jesus in his arms and praised God



Unknown to the parents, God had also revealed the birth of

Jesus to some wise men far away. A star had told them that a new King of the Jews would be born, so, off they went to the obvious

place to find a royal prince – the palace of King Herod. Herod, who was not a Jew, was a puppet king, placed there by Caesar. The history books tell us that Herod killed numerous people, including several members of his own family, to hang on to his power.



When the Wise Men asked where the baby was to be born, Herod's Jewish advisors had no difficulty in finding the prophecy of Micah which said that 'out of Bethlehem shall come one who will rule over Israel.'

Herod sent the Wise Men to find the child, then come back and tell him where he was. Herod claimed that he



also wanted to worship the new King, but God warned the Wise Men to go straight back home a different way. When Herod found out, he was furious. Based on the time the Wise Men had first seen the star, Herod ordered all boys in Bethlehem aged 2 and under to be killed. In a small village, this would have been about 20 children.



During his lifetime, Herod ordered the deaths of thousands of people, but Jesus escaped. In a dream, God sent an angel who warned Joseph, to wake Mary and immediately flee to Egypt.



It's amazing how many times God spoke to Joseph in dreams, and also how many prophecies were fulfilled through the actions of those who had no intention of serving God!

Thanks to Caesar Augustus, Jesus was born in Bethlehem. Herod's threats resulted in Hosea 11:1 being fulfilled: 'Out of Egypt I called my son'. And when Joseph feared returning to Bethlehem because Judea was ruled by Herod's awful son, Archelaus, God guided Joseph to Nazareth, fulfilling the

prophecy of Isaiah 9, that to Galilee of the Gentiles - the people living in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of the shadow of death a light has dawned."



Smuggling God's love to North Korean women

Your prayers and support make it possible for Open Doors fieldworkers to reach out and minister to North Korean refugees, many of whom have been trafficked into forced marriages.

It must be incredibly disorientating to find yourself alone in a foreign country, separated from loved ones, and then suddenly sold into marriage to someone you don't know and whose language you don't understand. How do you re-orient yourself?

This is the reality for many women who fall victim to people smugglers as they escape across the North Korean border. It's a desperate situation to be in – but thanks to your prayers and gifts, some of these women find themselves at an Open Doors safehouse, where they are welcomed, and given practical aid and pastoral care. They are also introduced to Jesus, who re-orients them. He becomes their refuge. Thanks to you, these women know that they are no longer alone.

Ha-Joon^{*} is an Open Doors fieldworker who meets with these women for food, prayer and fellowship. The journey to the safehouse is fraught with danger, as she doesn't know if she's being watched.

The risks of meeting together

At first, some of the North Korean women are distrustful. But as they come together, they start to share their stories. "We came here for the food," one woman jokes. "We have to eat!" Another woman shares that she has lost her sister, who had also escaped North Korea. But she hasn't heard from her and has no idea what's happened to her.

Amidst the sadness, there's room for joy too – and a palpable sense of God's presence. "We worshipped together, which was really special," Ha-Joon says. There was singing and dancing, and one woman had even memorised 50 Bible verses which she recited for the group.

Then suddenly, a woman's face appeared at the window, and everyone went quiet. Who was she? Would she report them to the secret police? "We all stopped breathing for a moment," Ha-Joon says. "The owner of the place immediately went outside to talk to the woman. I don't know what she said to her, but after she came back, she said everything was alright and we could continue with our programme.

"This ministry is only possible thanks to the prayers and generous support of our donors," adds Ha-Joon. "On behalf of the North Korean women and our local field workers, we thank you for your love, care and support."

How many Christians are there in North Korea? Approximately 400,00 (1%)

How are Christians persecuted in North Korea?

- If your Christian faith is discovered in North Korea, you could be killed on the spot.
- If you aren't killed, you will be sent to a horrendous labour camp and treated as a political criminal. You will be punished with years of hard labour that few survive.
- North Korean authorities are also likely to round up your extended family and punish them too, even if your family members aren't Christians themselves.

- North Korean refugees in other countries, particularly China, are at risk of being rounded up and sent back to appalling punishments. If it is discovered that a North Korean has become a Christian, or even simply heard the gospel or came into contact with Christians, then they will be singled out for severe punishment.
- Any Christian connection in your family history means that party membership is withheld, and you are consigned to the worst jobs and lowest positions.

Why are Christians persecuted in North Korea?

- The Kims demand total worship of themselves, and there is no freedom of religion in North Korea. Recognising any deity outside of the Kim family is considered a threat to the country's leadership. It's impossible to gather for worship or prayer, and even secret worship and prayer is an enormous risk.
- Christians face monitoring by official spies, but can also be reported by neighbours or teachers.
- 'Anti-reactionary thought laws' were enacted in December 2020 and made even clearer that being a Christian or owning a Bible is a serious crime and will be severely punished.

What has changed in North Korea in the past year?

- North Korea remains number one on the World Watch List a position it has held almost every year since 2002. The persecution score has risen two places in the past year, as there have been more reports of violence against Christians.
- In early 2024, the government announced stricter regulations and increased crackdowns. It has been officially reported that North Korean authorities publicly executed about 30 young teenagers for watching a South Korean drama on a USB drive, and several 17-year-olds were sentenced to life imprisonment or death for similar reasons in June and July 2024.
- Several citizens were sentenced to labour camps for picking up plastic bottles filled with cooking rice, which had been thrown from bordering South Korea.


