# The View From Number 6: Why do Christians struggle with change?

I have been reflecting on the Healing Service we had recently and have found myself wondering why it is that Christians are seemingly averse to change. There had been a good deal of negativity in the lead-up to the service from various quarters, as well as intense spiritual warfare. In the wee hours of the mornings, I'd found myself wrestling with whether I'd heard correctly from the Lord, or not, or if I wasn't listening properly in the first place. To cut a long story short, on the Sunday morning, I had received two words from the Lord, which in both cases, confirmed I was heading in the right direction!

Why do we, as Christians particularly, not like change? After all, it's a constant in life - unpredictable, sometimes unsettling, and often met with resistance. All people, regardless of background, may find change difficult, to one degree or another but there seems to be a particular reluctance within the Christian community when we are faced with notable changes to tradition, belief, or practice.

As Christians, we hold a deep reverence for tradition. Within our churches, we value continuity and draw upon centuries-old liturgies, creeds, and practices. This rootedness is not something random but reflects our desire to remain anchored in what is believed to be revealed truth.

In 2 Thessalonians 2:15, Paul writes, "So then, brothers and sisters, stand firm and hold fast to the teachings we passed on to you, whether by word of mouth or by letter." This call to "hold fast" to teachings, highlights the importance of stability and the transmission of faith from one generation to the next. So then, many Christians might perceive change as a threat to the integrity of the faith itself.

Furthermore, the idea of being "rooted and built up in Him" (Colossians 2:7) suggests to us that steadfastness is a virtue and that this spiritual grounding and being rooted in Christ, can foster a suspicion of any change, especially when it appears to challenge the theological or moral foundations upon which Christian

life is built.

Linked to the reverence for tradition, is the fear that change might dilute or erase Christian identity. Biblical accounts are filled with calls for God's people to remain distinct or separate, from the world— "Do not conform to the pattern of this world but be transformed by the renewing of your mind" (Romans 12:2). This admonition may lead Christians to be wary of changes that seem to arise from broader cultural pressures rather than from scriptural reflection.

This caution is partly due to a desire to preserve a unique identity as the people of God. For example, in the Old Testament, the Israelites are repeatedly warned against adopting the customs of surrounding nations (Leviticus 18:3).

For many Christians, maintaining faithfulness can mean holding firm against perceived intrusions of modernity, secularism, or even belief in Christ expressed by a community that doesn't meet 'our' ways of how things 'ought to be done,' and such resistance appears as an aversion to change.

Another reason Christians might resist change comes from theological conceptions of God Himself. In Malachi 3:6, God declares, "For I the Lord do not change; therefore you, O children of Jacob, are not consumed." Our God never changes-this is His nature and is foundational to our Christian theology. Hebrews 13:8 echoes this confidence: "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever."

Christian faith centres around a changeless God, thus stability and predictability are not just comforting—they are sacred. In the orderliness of worship and doctrine we discover the very character of the divine being reflected. This, in some way, explains why any significant shift in congregational life, church teaching, or moral standards can be experienced as profoundly unsettling.

Christianity is fundamentally communal and is shaped by the collective memory of God's acts in history: creation, covenant, redemption, and resurrection. Such rituals as communion – "Do this in remembrance of me" (Luke 22:19) – and the celebration of Christian holidays, reinforce our sense of continuity with the past and with the church universal. So, when change is proposed, whether in worship style, church governance, or even social engagement, it can feel like a rupture in the shared memory of the church. There is a

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very real concern that the community may lose touch with its spiritual ancestors and with the lessons gleaned from centuries of faithful living.

While resistance to change is understandable, we need to remember that throughout Scripture, God often called individuals and communities to step into the unknown. Abraham was told to leave his country (Genesis 12:1), the Israelites wandered through the wilderness (Exodus), and Jesus' ministry upended expectations about the Messiah and the Kingdom of God. The interesting thing is that even though these moments of change were radical, there is still a thread of continuity: God's faithfulness remains constant. And He is still the same today. He still calls people and communities out into the unknown and He is forever faithful. The call to "sing to the Lord a new song" (Psalm 96:1) reminds believers that God is always doing something fresh, inviting His people to participate in creative renewal while remaining anchored in His unchanging love.

Our challenge is not to reject change outright, but to discern when change is consistent with God's purposes. This was a dilemma faced by the early church-in Acts 15, for instance, when the Jerusalem Council had to decide whether Gentile converts should be required to follow Jewish law. The decision to welcome Gentiles without imposing the full weight of the Law of Moses was a huge change, but it was guided by prayerful discernment and grounded in the conviction that the Holy Spirit was at work (Acts 15:28).

Scripture encourages believers to "test everything; hold fast to what is good" (1 Thessalonians 5:21). This wisdom implies that not all change is bad; but rather, we are called to weigh such changes carefully, seeking the guidance of Scripture and the Holy Spirit.

To an extent, human psychology also plays a role. Change often brings with it, a sense of loss, uncertainty, and discomfort, which we don't like. Congregations may find comfort in familiar hymns, rituals, and social patterns. The prospect of the unknown can provoke anxiety, especially in times where the world around us is in great upheaval. We must recognise however, that the resistance to change is not *always* spiritual stubbornness; sometimes, it is a very human response to a world that is already moving too quickly.

The Bible offers both reassurance and challenge. In Isaiah 43:19, God proclaims, "See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do

you not perceive it?" Here, we understand that there is a sense of both excitement and apprehension which often accompanies the divine plan. As Christians, we are called to trust that God's purposes are ultimately for our good, even when the path forward is unfamiliar.

Philippians 3:13-14 urges believers to "forget what lies behind and strain forward to what lies ahead," pressing on toward God's calling. We are not being asked to discard the past, but rather to remain open to where God is leading next, rooted in faith, yet willing to be transformed.

Scripture challenges us to discern when change is necessary for renewal and greater faithfulness. As believers, our journey is one of both holding fast and letting go, trusting that God, who is eternally unchanging, is always at work making all things new.

May we, as believers move forward with humility, courage, and wisdom, ever praying, as the Psalmist does, "Teach me your way, O Lord, that I may walk in your truth" (Psalm 86:11). Amen.

### Ephesians Chapter 4:17 - 5:7

(some thoughts on Brian's Bible Bite exposition)

Paul begins this passage by shouting at the Ephesians (and us) ~ "**So I tell you this, and insist on it in the Lord**"... (in other words ~ "Listen Up"!)

We are no longer to live as our old selves did, and this radical change must be visible to those around us. Paul is referring to his previous words in which he tells us all to be "like Christ", and he now builds on what that should look like.

It is good to note that Ephesian culture was predominantly Greek and Roman, and these early Christians were surrounded by the 'futile thinking' of those who have 'hardened hearts' (those who are spiritually bereft). This is not so very different to the situation we find ourselves in today!

## We Are To Be Decisive, To Set Aside The Old And Put On The New ~ Truth

### Walking With God At All Times, Every Day

"...to be made new in the attitude of your minds; and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness" (4:23&24)

As John says, "Dear friends, now we are children of God, and what we will be has not yet been made known. But we know that when Christ appears, we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is. All who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure." (1 John 3: 2&3)

In the meantime, Paul gives some practical advice on what our new self should be:

- Honesty, speaking truth, not falsehood
- · Controlling anger, showing gentleness
- · Not stealing but giving generously

We must not let our guard down, but let self-control take hold through the Holy Spirit.

1 Peter 1:15&16 tells us, "But just as he who called you is holy, so be holy in all you do; for it is written: 'Be holy, because I am

# We Must Ask Ourselves "How Much Of The Old Self Is Hanging On?" Let's Be Sure That Day By Day We Are Becoming More Like Jesus

The final three verses of Chapter 4 present us with a significant challenge:

"And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with whom you were sealed for the day of redemption. Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice. Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you."

### We Are Called To Follow The Example Of God, Living Lives Of Love

Chapter 5 begins with stark warnings about what will result if we persist in "old ways", in particular, in loose talk, sexual immorality and idolatry. Such as these will NOT inherit the Kingdom!

"Your ways are in full view of the Lord, and he examines all your paths" (Proverbs 5:21)

But We Are Saints, Holy Ones, Standing Out, Shining Like Stars Paul speaks of this better way in his letter to the Romans:

"The night is nearly over; the day is almost here. So let us put aside the deeds of darkness and put on the armour of light. Let us behave decently, as in the daytime, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual immorality and debauchery, not in dissension and jealousy. Rather, clothe yourselves with the Lord Jesus Christ, and do not think about how to gratify the desires of the flesh" (Romans 13: 12-14)

### My Father God (Part Two)

The Freedom In Christ course examines some of the common deceptive thoughts that Christians who have not experienced Freedom in Christ may be led to entertain. At times, we all suffer these attacks of Satan, and I thought it would be good for us all to look at these and check that we are following the Truth. This is Part 2 of 2 articles in which Neil guides us... (see page 16 of last month's The Link for Part 1).

I renounce the lie that You, Father God, have been mean, cruel or abusive to me. Your word says: "The LORD is my rock, my fortress and my deliverer; my God is my rock, in whom I take refuge, my shield and the horn of my salvation, my stronghold" (Psalm 18:2) and "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light" (Matthew 11:28-30)

I choose to believe the truth that You, Father God, are loving, gentle and protective. It's Satan who is mean, cruel and abusive.

I renounce the lie that You, Father God, are denying me the pleasures of life. Your word says:

"Because of the LORD's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness" (Lamentations 3:22-23) and "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law. Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires". (Galatians 5:22-24)

I choose to believe the truth that You, Father God, are the author of life and will lead me into love, joy and peace when I choose to be filled with Your Spirit.

I renounce the lie that You, Father God, are trying to control and manipulate me. Your word says:

"It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery" (Galatians 5:1) and "For we do not have a high priest who is unable to feel sympathy for our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are — yet he did not sin. Let us then approach God's throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need" (Hebrews 4:15-16)

I choose to believe the truth that You, Father God, have set me free, and You give me the freedom to make choices and grow in Your grace.

I renounce the lie that You, Father God, have condemned me and no longer forgive me. Your Word says: "The days are coming," declares the LORD, 'when I will make a new covenant with the people of Israel and with the people of Judah. It will not be like the covenant I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to lead them out of Egypt, because they broke my covenant, though I was a husband to them, declares the LORD.

'This is the covenant that I will make with the people of Israel after that time,' declares the LORD. I will put my law in their minds and write it on their hearts. I will be their God, and they will be my people. No longer will they teach their neighbour, or say to one another, "Know the LORD, because they will all know me, from the least of them to the greatest,' declares the LORD. 'For I will forgive their wickedness and will remember their sins no more" (Jeremiah 31:31-34) and "Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus" (Romans 8:1)

I choose to believe the truth that You, Father God, have forgiven all my sins and will never use them against me in the future.

I renounce the lie that You, Father God, reject me when I fail to live a perfect and sinless life. Your word says: "For though the righteous fall seven times, they rise again, but the wicked stumble when calamity strikes" (Proverbs 24:16) and "But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, his Son, purifies us from all sin. If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. If we

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confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness. If we claim we have not sinned, we make him out to be a liar and his word is not in us.

My dear children, I write this to you so that you will not sin. But if anybody does sin, we have an advocate with the Father – Jesus Christ, the Righteous One. He is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not only for ours but also for the sins of the whole world" (1 John 1:7-2:2)

I choose to believe the truth that You, Father God, are patient towards me and cleanse me when I fall.

# Tears of joy as secret believers from North Korea are baptised

For secret believers worldwide, hidden faith also means hidden baptism, but this doesn't detract from the joy of such an occasion – and that was certainly the case for some secret believers from North Korea who were recently baptised.

There were tears of joy as a group of women who had fled North Korea braved huge dangers to get baptised in a secret location outside the country.

The ceremony was part of a project run by Open Doors fieldworkers that provides practical and pastoral care, together with Bible study, for women who have defected from the country. Many were trafficked and forced into marriages.

### "We prayed and went forward in faith"

Even though the baptisms took place outside of North Korea, the occasion was not without risk – in fact, they nearly didn't happen.

Security had intensified in the area where the baptisms were due to happen, with reports of increased police checkpoints and undercover officers. "When I travelled there, I saw more police on the road than I imagined," says a fieldworker. "Some were in plain clothes. We had to move with caution and say little. But we prayed and went forward in faith."

### Secret believer

Once inside the safehouse and before getting baptised, the women received some final teaching. "They were nervous, but determined," says the fieldworker. "We prepared the Communion elements in the kitchen while they studied the meaning of baptism. When we all gathered for worship, the tears began to flow."

One by one, the women were baptised in a moving service filled with singing, prayer and silent cries. Afterwards, they celebrated with a shared meal and received gifts, with each one given a cross and a traditional, colourful Korean dress (hanbok). "One of them told me, 'This is the first time I've worn a hanbok since I left North Korea.' She cried when she put it on."

### No longer alone

The next day, the group moved to another secret location to receive some training. "They brought us mushrooms and dried greens as gifts," says the fieldworker. "It was incredibly humbling. These women have so little, but they give with their whole hearts."

It was there that one woman shared her story. "After I believed in the Father, everything started to change," she said. "I'm not alone anymore."

The women then returned to their respective foreign families. Some are treated well, while others are abused. However, many of the women say that their life is better now than when they lived in their home country.

"Especially now, with the current currency devaluation. Life is even more difficult back home." shared one of the women.

Those like the women helped by our fieldworkers often try to save some money and send it to their relatives in North Korea to help them survive the awful conditions. "Sometimes supporting their family is the only reason they still want to live," says Brother X, Open Doors' North Korea coordinator.

### Faith overcomes fear

"We walk in fear sometimes. But more than that, we walk in faith"

"Our women's project shows them that they are not alone," he continues. "Working with them is not easy, but we see many positive changes. Some can become leaders and start their own Bible study groups for North Korean women. They learn about baptism during those studies, but being baptised is very dangerous, even outside the country. That's why we are so grateful that we could have the ceremony."

Such ceremonies, and the transformed lives they celebrate, couldn't take place without your faithful prayers and gifts. Thank you! You're helping them take bold steps of faith in secret – but with great joy.

"We walk in fear sometimes," adds the fieldworker. "But more than that, we walk in faith. And God meets us every time."

### Brian's visit to Uganda (photos on next two pages)

As part of his sabbatical, our minister Brian recently travelled to Uganda with his daughter Rachel and spent a day at Kalasa Reformed Presbyterian Church, a village to the northwest of Kampala. We have supported the ministry there every year since Martin and Gertrude Sebbugo visited Shanklin in 1996 through the Romans One Eleven Trust (a charity to foster links with Africa that was formed by the former chair of GEAR — Rev Dr John Hall). Brian has visited three times before but not since November 2006. The Sebbugos did come to Shanklin again in May 2011 and had a wonderful couple of days with us and with Ryde URC.

Brian preached at the service on 1<sup>st</sup> June and Rachel joined in with the ladies dancing. They presented a banner that Meryl had made to celebrate our partnership of nearly 30 years, along with some other gifts including some old football shirts from Shanklin FC which Rachel had acquired through a friend at work.. They were then shown around the school site, where Brian saw Shanklin block 2 for the first time. A traditional Ugandan lunch followed with the church leaders comprising chicken, goat, rice, ground nut sauce, matoke (green mashed banana), casava, potato and avocado.. with gorgeous fruit to follow – the freshest mango and pineapple.

Please pray for the ministry as a new school has just been built by another group right next door to the church site. It isn't clear what effect this may have on the church school and they are seeking to be gracious about it and press on with the Lord's work (theirs is an unashamedly Christian school).

Brian and Rachel also dropped in to Luwafu RPCU on the Monday and Brian led an impromptu school assembly before spending some time around Kampala and enjoying a meal at Martin and Gertrude's home, where their daughter Doreen and grandson Titus (pictured) live, along with their foster daughter Jovia (20, who they brought up from a baby). They usually spend 6 nights a week up at Kalasa & are rarely at home.

Brian and Rachel then enjoyed an amazing three-day safari up to Murchison Falls, after which they flew on to Madagascar to spend a week of holiday with Sarah who has been there for a year with Mercy Ships. She returns to her NHS job in Nottingham in mid-July and would value prayers for the massive readjustment.

Rev Jon Sermon ,who now leads Romans 1.11, will be taking a team out to Uganda again in August and visiting various congregations.

### Pastors facing fiery trials

Christianity may have gained a certain level of acceptance in the popular South-East Asian tourist destination of Laos, but scratch beneath the surface and you will find deep hostility and discrimination.

Following the killing of a pastor last year, writes James Fraser, I wanted to find out what life was really like for Christians, especially church leaders.

What was notable was their attitude to suffering for the gospel. At a conference organised by Release International partners we were told the pastors thought it strange that we wanted to hear their stories of persecution: for them suffering was not unusual - it was a normal part of following Jesus!

One pastor we met, X, has dedicated his life to reaching a minority people group in rural Laos. X's work has not gone unnoticed by the authorities. He has been arrested, interrogated and has faced repeated harassment. The authorities have threatened to discredit him with false accusations.

X is worried that his life is genuinely at risk. Sometimes he wonders if he and his wife should leave the area. But they remain committed to the work. 'Deep down I feel like I am being used by God and will leave a good legacy among the people I am serving,' he said.

**Appley Tower**: "Just wanted to inform you that the prayer event went well at Appley Tower. It was great to be in fellowship with the rest of the groups spread across the Island at the given time table".

**Boniface and Ventnor Downs**: "We had an encouraging time praying. We had 17 there, including people from St. Catherine's Ventnor, True Vine, Deeper Life, the United Reformed Church Shanklin and Altitude. It was powerful reading out the declarations together."

It was a great view of the island up on the monument so we could direct our prayers visually to the appropriate places. The Isle of Wight shall be saved!"

**St Helen's, Duver** "There were five of us gathered on St Helen's Duver praising God, giving him our thanks and praying for the Isle of Wight. It was very windy and we were gathered in one place - which was a timely reminder of that first Pentecost!"

**Shanklin**: "We at Shanklin found it very powerful. We had 16 on the beach and 15 scattered high and in houses - 31 altogether. It was a very awesome experience and a very blessed time."

## **Bible Society - Mission Update**

There's no stopping an Iranian Bible worker despite her being unable to visit her home country

## Mission possible: A million Bibles for Iran

Iran is one of the toughest places on earth to follow Jesus, but the underground church movement is vibrant and growing. Bible worker Nahid Sepehrifard is aiming to get a million Bibles into Iran over the coming years, and she needs your prayerful support to achieve this.

Nahid is Iranian but can't go to Iran because Bible Society was expelled in 1990, so she works wherever in the world she and her laptop happen to be.

Historically, the population of Iran is overwhelmingly Islamic, but things got very difficult for Christians when the pro-Western monarchy was replaced with a clerical dictatorship in 1979. Bible Society in Iran, then led by Nahid's father, struggled through the 1980s.

'My father wanted to print Bibles in Iran,' Nahid says. 'He was not allowed. The new authorities were offended by the claim that Jesus is the Son of God. They wanted that removed. My father would not allow that. He fought and he won. He was able to print Bibles in Iran until February 1990, when everything stopped.'

Pressure increased on churches that held services in Farsi, Iran's main language. 'One by one, the pastors were killed,' Nahid says.

Despite this, there are now hundreds of thousands of Christians in Iran, and some estimate a million or more. 'Even the Government admits that Christianity is growing. Persecution has made the Church stronger. When life is good, you can forget God. But pain draws you to God. Many young Iranians want to know Jesus.'

Nahid dreams of returning to Iran to give out one million Bibles freely. 'It won't be soon, but we know it will happen. We've got to be ready.'

For now, Nahid and her small team have a thriving ministry among Iranians who live outside of Iran, and have a livestream on social media that takes prayer requests.

One lady, an Iranian in Europe, told her, 'I don't know your God. I

just found your page on Instagram and I need prayer for dizziness.'

'We prayed,' says Nahid, 'and three days later she was better. She'd been seeing a doctor for years with this problem! The lady then told us, "Your God is worthy to be known."

Then there was an atheist who was depressed, so the team introduced her to their counselling service. She'd suffered sexual abuse as a child. She asked for a Bible. 'Last December, she was baptised by my husband,' says Nahid.

Nahid thanks Bible Society supporters for their regular giving and support of her ministry.

'I have been given a free Bible in Farsi,' said one Iranian migrant. 'My favourite verse is 1 John 4.16. God is love. Jesus said forgive your enemies. He sacrificed himself. I used to chant, "Death to America," but now I pray for peace.'

### **Please Pray**

- > Pray for the underground churches in Iran, that the eyes of the authorities will not see them, and that they will continue to flourish.
- Ask God to encourage Nahid and her team through the ups and the downs as they strive to get a million Bibles into Iran in the coming years.
- Pray for Iranians who have fled Iran. As refugees they're extremely vulnerable and could be returned to Iran at any time. Pray that exile is an opportunity for them, both to build a new life and to find God.

# "This is horror. This is terror" – more devastating attacks in Nigeria

There have been yet more deadly attacks in Nigeria, with Christians among more than 100 killed and thousands displaced. Please pray.

More than 100 have been killed and around 5,000 displaced in a series of attacks by Islamist militants in Nigeria, many of which are believed to be 'revenge' against a local bishop who testified to the US Congress about the ongoing violence in the region.

### **Bishop threatened**

On Saturday 24 May, there were a series of shootings by Fulani militants in the villages of Tse-Ubiam and Tyolaha in Benue State, killing ten people. The following day, 20 were killed in shootings in Aondona and Ahume, and in a further attack on Yelewata village. On Monday, gunmen returned to two of the villages, taking aim and shooting survivors on sight. By Tuesday, the local government chairman confirmed over 40 had been killed.

The attacks happened in Gwer West, part of the Makurdi Diocese – the very diocese led by Bishop Wilfred Anagbe, who testified to US Congress. "This is horror. This is terror," said Fr Oliver Ortese. "You cannot imagine the reality we live in here."

The bishop's comments about the mass killing of Christians 'drew threats from both some Islamic groups and the government', according to Fr. Moses Aondover Iorapuu of Makurdi Diocese. "It took support from the US government for Bishop Anagbe to return to Nigeria without detention, but we suspected there would be an aftermath."

## Mourners attacked at graveside

There were further attacks some 400km away in Taraba State. Also on Saturday 24<sup>th</sup> May, an armed motorcycle convoy stormed homes, killing 42 people, including 24 members of a local Methodist church. "We didn't know where to run to," said Soja Emmanuel, a survivor. "They came around 02:00, shooting sporadically. People jumped out of their homes into the bush. Some didn't make it."

"We counted 42 corpses before noon on Saturday," a soldier told national newspapers. "This is beyond anything we've seen before." The exact death toll in Taraba remains uncertain.

Meanwhile, in Bokkos County in Plateau State, details are still emerging of a series of attacks by Fulani militants that begun on Sunday 25 May, with nine people reported dead so far. It's understood that a mass burial of those killed in Kopmur village came under fire when gunmen returned to attack mourners at the graveside. Dozens of Christians are said to be trapped in forests and mountain hideouts, unable to escape as the militants continue to roam through the villages.

At the time of writing, terror alerts are in force across Plateau State. It is not clear whether security agencies have quelled the violence.

## Failure of state and security

The scale of bloodshed and the multiple failures of security are fuelling mounting criticism of state governors, who appear powerless to protect communities.

"When the very diocese whose bishop courageously testified suddenly finds itself burying scores of its people – including from his own village – serious questions are raised," says John Samuel\*, Open Doors legal expert for sub-Saharan Africa. "Many don't feel safe anymore, only because they identify as Christian.

"Christian persecution in Nigeria has reached such levels that observers struggle to fully document each atrocity before the next begins.

#### **The Link** - July 2025

"Accountability remains scarce for these grave violations of the fundamental rights to life, liberty and freedom. The Nigerian government is failing to protect Christians who are killed in indiscriminate attacks. We call on the Nigerian government to do everything in its power to protect vulnerable Christian communities.

# Nigeria is number 7 in the Open Doors Worl Watch List Top 50 Why are Christians persecuted in Nigeria?

Nigeria has greater religious freedom than other countries in the World Watch List top 10, but the biggest threat is from Islamic militants who seek to destroy Christianity and Christians in the region.


Christians living in the Sharia (Islamic law) states of northern Nigeria can also face discrimination and oppression as second-class citizens. Converts from Islam often experience rejection from their own families and pressure to renounce their new faith. They often have to flee their homes for fear of being killed.

## What has changed in Nigeria in the past year?

There were hopes that Bola Tinubu's 2023 election as president would cause a positive shift towards recognising and intervening against human rights violations affecting Christians, but this has not yet materialised.

Unfortunately, very little has changed in Nigeria this year. Christians living in parts of the country continue to endure extreme violence and danger for their faith.

## Bembridge Fort - Reopened!

You may recognise some familiar faces from the attached photograph – we were pleased and really surprised by what we discovered as part of a special tour of the recently partly reopened Bembridge Fort - high up on Culver Down. Despite very blustery weather we joined a great fort tour for the Mercedes Car Club on Saturday 24<sup>th</sup> along with a trip to the forts second-hand book shop and a great retreat to the Culver Haven for a splendid lunch.

Bembridge Fort was completed in 1867 as one of 22 Victorian 'Palmerston Forts' around the Island (including the four Solent Forts) as defensive lines against a perceived threat of a French invasion by Napoleon III after 1859. The fort was used during both the First and Second World Wars. During WW2 the Fort became one of the most secret places in the country, with all three armed services located within the reactivated and now well protected fort. It was critical for the defence of the Island, with many advanced systems developed there.

For over 165 years the doors have been locked due to military use and for the last 50 years it has been a private commercial engineering works, so it has always remained something of a mystery, but now all that is changing!

The National Trust have owned the fort since 1965 but in October 2024 Bembridge Fort was transferred to the Bembridge Fort Trust (BFT) who have taken on the huge task of the operation, management and restoration of the entire fort. BFT have ambitious plans that will see the whole fort brought back into varied and exciting community use while restoring and preserving the fort and interpreting the fort's role in wartime. The plan is to not only save Bembridge Fort as a building, but also create something that will leave a lasting legacy for future generations.
